

ARMY HAS 221 LOCAL YOUTHS UNDER COLORS

According to a report from Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer of the United States army at Portland, Oregon, a total of 221 Klamath young men have volunteered for service in the regular army since the local recruiting office, under the command of Sergeant Frank J. Huhn, opened in the postoffice building. Of this number 165 passed the examinations and are now serving at various army posts throughout the United States and in our overseas possessions. This patriotic willingness to serve their country in time of need has raised Klamath Falls to first place among all the Oregon sub-stations which are located in all the larger Oregon cities, and has also substantially reduced the quota of selective service trainees required by the national defense program. 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LIST STILL OPEN FOR PILOT SCHOOL

Young men and women between the ages of 19 and 26 still have the opportunity of signing up for the local C.A.A. ground school, and there are absolutely no educational requirements, it was made known Tuesday at the chamber of commerce.

First meeting of the new ground course was held Monday night at the Fremont school. The class was to meet again Tuesday night at 7 o'clock and will continue Wednesday night. Regular meetings will be held hereafter three nights per week.

To clear up a misunderstanding, it was made known by chamber officials and Max Guilley, ground instructor, that persons need not have attended college to be eligible. The class is conducted as a non-college course and there are no educational requirements.

Thirty-nine have signed up for the course to date.

Applications will be taken at the chamber of commerce until noon Saturday, January 11. Persons interested are urged to sign up, inasmuch as 10 instead of five will be selected for flight instruction if the total enrolled in the ground school passes 50.
