POSTOFFICE SHOWS \$12,800 GAIN HERE

A neat gain of \$12,800.20 was noticed in the official 1940 report issued Wednesday by Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins as he closed the books for the year and prepared to chalk up growing 1941 figures.

Through the local postoffice passed packages, letters, money orders, cards and other forms of postal business, totaling \$145,091.16, as compared to 1939's figure of \$132,230.96. Biggest month of the year was December, with a total of \$20,045.72.

Following is the complete report of the year's business, month by month, with a quarterly total: January, \$11,514.77; February, \$10,102.14; March, \$10,903.39; April, \$11,433.71; May, \$11,300.01; June, \$10,816.17; July, \$12,148.72; August, \$11,466.58; September, \$10,330.27; October, \$13,732.87; November, \$11,006.83; December, \$20,045.72. First quarter, \$32,300.30; second quarter, \$33,639.89; third quarter, \$34,145.55; fourth quarter, \$44,785.42; total, \$145,091.16.

AFL TAKES OVER HIRING MEN FOR TULE LAKE TUNNEL

All men employed on the Tule lake sump tunnel project have been signed up with the AFL, and further hiring is being done through the local AFL office, it was announced Wednesday by Joe Willis at the labor temple.

Work on the tunnel project is progressing rapidly, the tunnel having been advanced about 500 feet on the Tule lake side. Within 48 hours crews will start drilling from the other side of the ridge which is being penetrated by the drainage project.

NEW SUPER SERVICE STATION UNDER WAY

The General Petroleum station at Sixth and Walnut is having its face lifted. The quarters occupied by the Hickman Coffee shop facing South Sixth street, are being torn down and will give way to a super station to include a new steel structure for the office building and pump station. W. D. Miller has the contract for the work.

The section of the "L" shaped building occupied at the present time by the Kimball Glass company, will remain, it is understood. The permit was issued the latter part of 1940, and was one of the largest which involved automotive service.
