low dive attacks made on air-dromes last week."

The grounded Italian planes at El Adem, 15 miles south of Tobruk, were taken Tuesday when British forces captured that base which had served as Tobruk's airport.

Ground forces assaulting Gazala apparently timed their blow with an RAF raid in which participating pilots told of wrecking grounded planes with an intensive bombardment.

The Gazala air attack was only one of a series spread out by the RAF along the Libyan coast all the way to the port of Bengasi, 300 miles from the Egyptian frontier.
