Legislative Delegation

KLAMATH'S delegates to the Oregon legislature should be in line for favorable committee appointments and they should be able to wield helpful influence for their districts and the state as a whole at the Salem session which opens Monday.

While new to the senate, Marshall Cornett is a member of the majority party and is already receiving favorable attention. The Oregon Voter, in its survey of the legislative personnel, states there is a "strong belief in informed sectors that the 17th district is sending an especially capable and qualified senator to Salem." Mr. Cornett is well informed and accustomed to activity in public affairs. For a neophyte, we anticipate he will show unusual adaptability and will quickly assume a position on a par with experienced senators.

Henry Semon is one of only five members of the lower house who will be serving their fifth session. The Voter, in comment upon him, remarks that he is a "plain, sane, sound, successful potato farmer," who has "made warm friends, political and otherwise, all over the state and this is a real help to a lawmaker." Mr. Semon has served on the highly important ways and means committee in a number of sessions, and his prestige and ability are such that he should be one of the most useful members of the house at the coming meeting.

Back to the house from this county goes a former speaker, Harry D. Boivin. Mr. Boivin likewise is well experienced in legislative work, and in addition to having held the speakership has served on many important committees. The Voter editor offered some criticism of Mr. Boivin's part in the last session, but agrees that he is effective as a legislator and praised his voting record. As a veteran and an able attorney, Mr. Boivin may be expected to contribute intelligently and effectively to the work of the Klamath delegation at Salem this year.

The Klamath legislators know their district and its needs. People here should not be hesitant in communicating with them about matters which may be brought before the law-making bodies.

News Behind THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9—Congress may think it has been dieting the national labor relations board into a sylphlike slenderness. But the new supreme court is now feeding it vitamins on the side so fast that even NLRB's papa won't recognize it when the court gets through.

In the Link Belt case, for a prime instance, Justice William Douglas spoke for the court the edict that conclusive facts are not necessary for NLRB to find a man guilty. "Here no one fact is conclusive," the justice said. "But the whole coperies of the facts before the board support its findings." (The word is "congeries" not "conjuries," as Douglas used it.)

But the greatest expansion of power NLRB has received since its inception was in the simultaneous decision in the Heinz case.

The man who wrote the law, Senator Robert Wagner, said in presenting it to congress that it did not "require an employer to sign any agreement of any kind. Congress has no power to impose such a requirement. An agreement pre-supposes mutual consent."

Mr. Wagner has found out different, since the Heinz decision. There the court said with less ambiguity than the words imply: An employer may not have to make an agreement, but he must put it in writing.

The fact seems to be that the Wagner act was written in its broadest terms to give NLRB the power to do about what it sees fit to accomplish its purpose, and the supreme court is now writing expansive details into the law in terms which NLRB has chosen.

RELIEF PARADOX

Mr. Roosevelt's budget may have seemed to be a mystifying contradiction. He predicted the greatest boom in the history of the nation (a national income of \$87,000,000,000) for precisely the same period of time in which he wants a billion dollars—yes \$1,000,000,000—to spend for relief.

In explanation, the following example of the relief-boom situation has been critically given: There was a plant down south employing 1,000 negro and white WPA men. The foreman, in changing the plant over for more permanent work under civil service, went through the rolls and found there were only 600 men who were capable of holding a steady job. The other 400 were either elderly (although under 65 and therefore not eligible for old age pensions), or did not have the mental capacity to even dig a ditch, or were so unsteady (it might have been liquor or something else) that they could not be depended upon to show up for work five days a week at 8 a. m.

They were really unemployed, incapables. Healthy

enough in a physical way, they could just not expect to find employment anywhere in private industry even in boom times when every man is needed for national defense.

But to classify them as what they are would hurt them, in the opinion of the federal administration. While the states are supposed to handle unemployed, this class created a borderline situation in which it was thought best to continue the relief appropriations.

This situation applies generally and nationally. Therefore the relief budget for the next year can be cut only one-third.

PERMANENT LOAD

What the administration is driving at here apparently is the permanent establishment of a system of support for incapables. If their need is to be a billion dollars in the coming fiscal year (June to June) when the nation is making an unparalleled effort to defend itself, it is not likely to be less in future years. The work projects administration is to decide which ones are really incapable and which are only slothful by nature. The money is to be given for whatever work they appear capable of doing irregularly. It is to be easy work.

Congress will investigate the situation to find how generally the condition of the southern factory may apply, and whether a billion dollars is needed for the purpose. But its inquiry can be made only through questioning officials of WPA who gave the president his recommendations.

The appropriation, therefore, may be sliced but not much.

INDEPENDENT

Justice Stanley Reed who argued for many a new deal point as solicitor general before his appointment to the supreme bench, is showing signs of independence. He differed with his new deal colleagues, Justices Frankfurter, Douglas and Black in the Connecticut railway decision. In another case involving technical questions, Reed refused to accept the reasoning of Douglas. Again he supported Chief Justice Hughes when Black and Douglas differed.

ERROR
