INSIDE ENGLAND PARTY STRUGGLE BEHIND BRITISH BID FOR RUSS AID

(Editor's Note: William McGaffin, back from three years' service as correspondent in England and France, pictures the political differences which complicate Winston Churchill's problems, in this last of four behind-the-scenes stories).

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—A few short hours after Anthony Eden moved into the British foreign office again after the three-year absence precipitated by the Chamberlain appeasement program, he was closeted in a long "friendly" talk with Russia Ambassador Maisky.

This was an unusual experience for the little Russian. Repeated rebuffs had been his fate under Eden's predecessor, Lord Halifax, whose appointment as ambassador to Washington left the post clear for the return Eden always had yearned to make.

The meeting symbolizes a pressing double problem which has weighed on Winston Churchill ever since he became prime minister—that is, how to win Russian support, and how to control Britain's reactionary conservative party which dominates the country's political life. The two are related.

Britain even under Chamberlain recognized the need of Russian cooperation, if possible, of Russian neutrality, at the least. But the courting of the Russian bear was halfhearted and futile, particularly under Lord Halifax. He represents the dominating reactionary element in the conservative party that has always feared communism more than nazism—at least up to the beginning of the war.

England finally sent wealthy Socialist Sir Stafford Cripps to Moscow to try his luck. But Halifax critics say that as fast as Cripps made any progress his lordship back in London responded with some maneuver that nullified the gain.

Eden and Churchill are conservatives, too, but of the "young Turk" brand. With the fate of the empire hanging in the balance, they see as vitally important the task of winning soviet Russia with her immense reservoir of manpower and resources to Britain's aid—or at least preventing her from springing to life on Hitler's side.

"right side" of most of the important international developments of interest to Russia ever since the Spanish civil war.

These include the matter of Spanish non-intervention, the Chinese-Japanese war, and non-appeasement in the Czechoslovak crisis which led to the Munich carve-up.

The Russians themselves say that Eden is one of the Englishmen they "distrust the least." The question is: Can he tear down the great wall of suspicion and distrust erected in Russian minds by a long line of old guard British statesmen?

STUART FREED IN AUTO DEATH CASE

An involuntary manslaughter charge against Kenneth Stuart, an automobile salesman, as a result of the death of Philip Blackman, 22-year-old Henley youth who died in his flaming car following a crash on September 29, was dismissed Wednesday on a motion of District Attorney Orth Sismore.

Insufficient evidence was given as the cause in the dismissal.

Stuart was ordered held by the grand jury following a recommendation of a coroner's jury inquest. A \$10,000 damage suit against him and the Turner Chevrolet company brought by Will Blackman, the victim's father, is still pending.

AIKEN GIVEN FIVE YEARS FOR LARCENY

New Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg issued the first criminal sentence of his tenure Wednesday by giving Criss Aiken, 24, a five year term in the state penitentiary.

Aiken, said to have previously served a stretch for a Bend robbery, pleaded guilty to stealing a saddle from Eddie Cookman, Chiloquin, on January 5.

Observers compared it to the two-year larceny sentence usually handed down by Judge Vandenberg's predecessor, Edward B. Ashurst.

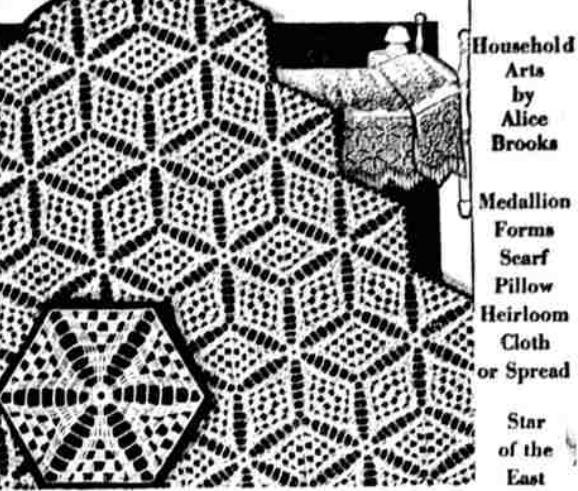
