would relate only to defense articles actually supplied to foreign nations under the bill.

The government, Barkley explained, would order for foreign governments "only those materials which our army and navy could use."

"This means that we shall be producing the same material for our friends as for ourselves," he said.

"It should eliminate double assembly lines in our factories, and should help to standardize our war materials among the democracies."

Barkley said the measure contained no waiver of the wage-hour law, the Walsh-Healey public contracts act or the Wagner labor relations act.

Mr. Roosevelt, besides discussing the aid-to-Britain legislation, announced that he had signed a proclamation requiring copper, brass, bronze, zinc, nickel, and polish to be exported only under export licenses, effective Feb. 3. These materials, he said, are needed for American defense.

The president told reporters that he did not necessarily want the powers apparently contained in the British aid bill, but that somebody must have it in order to take quick action.

POLICE TO TAKE FIRST AID COURSE

officer and in the latter's car returned to the vicinity. They saw the Georgia car speed away from the Elk garage where it had taken on a full load of gasoline.

The driver refused to recognize the officer's siren, and sent the car at a 55 to 60-mile-an-hour pace through the underpass, left on South Sixth street, and on through Dairy, Bonanza and Bly. Finally, on the summit of Quartz mountain, the Georgia car stalled with a "vapor lock," and city police made the arrest on speeding and no operator's license charges. Bariges was unarmed, officers said, and gave no resistance.

Red Hot Pursuit

At times the state police officer reported his speedometer passed the 85-mile-per-hour mark, and the Bariges car "must have been going between 90 and 95 miles per hour."

The two officers took Bariges on to Lakeview, where they placed a call to San Francisco, checking to see on what charges the man was wanted. Developments proved Bariges was also wanted in Salem, and in Spokane. He was then returned to the city jail, and transferred to the county jail from where he was removed Friday morning to Salem.

by pilots of the coastal command who reported starting fires near the military port and direct hits on a large ship in the harbor.

Big Explosion

Other bombs were declared to have burst on the mole and between the docks. One pilot said his salvo burst near a drydock, followed by an immense explosion.

"A building literally disintegrated and a mushroom of black smoke rose to a height of several hundred feet," this pilot said.

The air ministry said the Brest attack was made by a strong force of planes aided by bright moonlight in which the docks could be picked out clearly.

BERLIN, Jan. 10 (AP)—British planes raiding "various places" in western Germany last night killed 20 persons and left many injuries, the German high command announced today.

The British raids were carried out, today's communique said, while German planes were attacking central and southern England with especially heavy poundings administered to Manchester, Liverpool and London.

The high command said the British failed to hit any military or military-economic objectives, adding that the chief damage was inflicted on several apartment houses, Bethlehem cloisters near Cologne and a Catholic journeymen's home at Dueseldorf. The latter was said to have been destroyed.
