

JANUARY IMPORTANT JOB BENEFIT MONTH

January is the all-important month of the year for unemployment taxes and insurance.

Not only do most of the claimants come in at this start of the benefit year, but also quarterly payroll tax payments are due, annual deductions must be made under the social security act, and employers who want exemption must give notice of withdrawal.

Of the 64,947 claims for jobless benefits last year, 34,174 were taken before the end of January. About the same proportion is expected this year, though the totals promise to be considerably less. So far, 13,915 claims have been taken against 17,746 for the corresponding period a year ago—a decrease of nearly 22 per cent.

About 10,500 employers of four or more workers are expected to pay the state more than a million and a half dollars in January for taxes on wages during the last three months of 1940.

More than 5,000 employers of eight or more workers have until January 30 to deduct, under title IX of the social security act, the 2.7 per cent payroll tax paid to the state on 1940 wages. Forms for deducting this tax must be filled out when paying the annual 3 per cent tax to the internal revenue office.

Covered employers continue subject to the tax until they go through a calendar year without employing four or more employees, and without having a payroll of \$500.00 in any quarter. In any case written notice of withdrawal must be made in January, following an entire year of less than minimum conditions.

"If any employer is in doubt about coverage, he should consult an auditor or other representative of the commission," declares Administrator Silar Gaiser. "If notice is not given during this 30-day period, the law provides the employer must wait until next year to escape the tax."

SPINACH SHORTAGE FACING NATION

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 10 (AP) Attention youngsters:

"There will be a serious shortage of spinach in the United States in 1942," Harm Drewes, plant breeding expert, told a meeting Wednesday of vegetable growers from eight northern New Jersey counties, sponsored by the agricultural extension service.

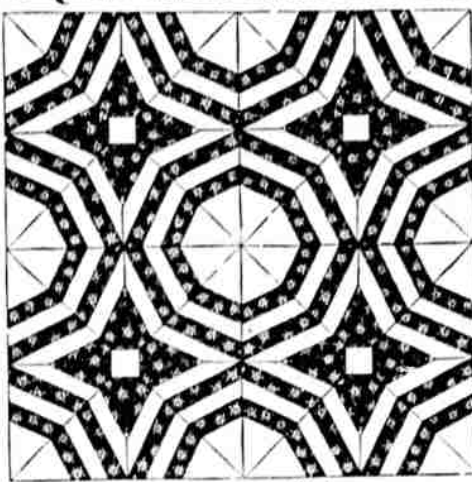
He said 90 per cent of spinach seed used in this country in the past had been imported from Holland, and the supply was cut off by the German invasion of the low countries. Seed grown in the state of Washington and the east is insufficient to meet the demand, Drewes said.

Increased use of beet greens, mustard green, Italian dandelion and lettuce was forecast by him as a probable result.

Fish Chowders Will Make Appetizing Meals-in-a-dish

FISH chowders have an honorable tradition in this country. They provide fine flavor, high grade nutrition and meals-in-a-dish for little money, and less kitchen labor. Therefore, they belong in the private cook book of women determined to keep their food standards high despite budget restrictions.

With a slightly Spanish-American accent comes this recipe:

SPANISH-AMERICAN FISH CHOWDER

(serves 4 to 6)
Two strips lean bacon, chopped; 1/2 cup tomatoes (fresh or canned); 1 cup dried raw potatoes; 1 cup raw fish, shredded (save bones and skin); 1 green pepper, chopped; 1 medium onion, chopped.

Following order given, place ingredients in alternate layers in double boiler. Season with pepper and salt.

Cover fish bones and skin with 1 1/2 cups water if necessary to keep 1 1/2 cups for final measuring. Strain and pour over mixture in double boiler. Boil 1 hour without stirring.

Before serving add 1 pint hot milk and 1/2 cup broken crackers to chowder. Stir and serve.

Slightly more complicated but marvelous to eat is this chowder:

NEW ENGLAND FISH CHOWDER

(serves 4 to 6)

One pound fish; 1 cup diced salt pork; 2 medium onions, minced; 3 medium potatoes, diced; 2 cups scalded milk; 3 tablespoons butter, salt and pepper, pilot crackers.

Cook head, bones, skin and all trimmings of fish in water for 20 minutes. Strain stock and add enough boiling water to make 4 cups of liquid. Cut cleaned fish into cubes. Roll in seasoned flour. Fry salt pork until brown. Remove pork and brown onions in fat. Combine pork, onions, potatoes and fish in large saucepan. Add strained fish stock. Cover and simmer without stirring until potatoes and fish are tender.

Then add scalded milk, butter and seasoning to taste. Bring to boil and serve at once. Break pilot biscuits into chowder.

MENU

ZELLERBACH MOVES TOWARD CLEARING INDEBTEDNESS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10 (UP) Crown Zellerbach corporation has prepared an additional \$1,000,000 of long-term bank loans since January 2, the company announced Wednesday night, as a step toward rapid liquidation of term indebtedness. The prepayment, representing the maturity due February 1, 1942, reduces the total indebtedness to banks to \$10,500,000 and brings the total amount paid on the loans during the company's current fiscal year to date to \$3,650,000.
