

LOCAL LANDMARK BEING TORN DOWN

Another old Klamath Falls landmark was being reduced to a pile of timber and old bricks this week as workmen started razing the US reclamation building located at Eleventh and High streets. The work is being done by the CCC boys and the department of reclamation.

The wooden structure was built in 1907 and occupied by the bureau of reclamation until offices were included in the new federal building. The property has remained in the hands of the government. Last year a church organization used the building and during the occupancy a fire occurred which partially destroyed the structure. It was not deemed advisable to repair the building.

LEAVITT STUDIES CRATER PARK MATTERS HERE

E. P. Leavitt, superintendent of Crater Lake national park, spent Tuesday and Wednesday in Klamath Falls from headquarters in Medford, looking up land matters concerning rights-of-way to survey new roads within the park area.

Leavitt announced he would leave this weekend for Washington, D. C., to attend the park superintendents' conference at which time national park problems will be discussed. The conference is called for January 19.

By arrangement with Crater Lake, and due to the fact the park is short-handed, Don Fisher has been named to handle the Anna Springs checking station each Sunday during the winter sports period. Fisher is acting custodian of the Lava Beds national monument and in charge of the branch office of the Crater Lake national park in the federal building.

NATURALIST TO ADDRESS ROTARY CLUB AT TULELAKE

Naturalist M. V. Walker, who replaced John Doerr as naturalist at Crater Lake national park, will be the speaker at the Tulelake Rotary club next Wednesday, it was announced by Don Fisher, who will serve as chairman of the day.

Walker will discuss his work in the various parks, having served as naturalist at both Bryce and Zion parks in Utah. He has been in the park service for the past 10 years, and with Crater Lake since July of 1940.

AUTO SHOW MAY BE OUT FOR NEXT YEAR

DETROIT, Jan. 10 (UP)—Automobile manufacturers are considering calling off the 1942 model national automobile show, indicating for the first time officially that defense production is expected to cut heavily into plans for next year.

All auto companies except one large corporation, it was learned today, have agreed to cancel the annual show in New York to concentrate time and resources to the rapidly broadening defense needs in the industry.

The action does not mean there will be no 1942 models, however, an AMA spokesman emphasized. A check of auto makers by The United Press disclosed all are planning new models for presentation next fall but design and motor changes generally will be restricted.

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MISSING CHECKS 'LOST' IN BAG
