Inspiring Lecture Is Scheduled

Dr. Irma Gordon To Address University Women And Guests at Dinner Meeting Wednesday

Few programs slated by the Klamath chapter of the American Association of University Women have aroused as much interest as that planned for Wednesday evening, January the fifteenth, when Dr. Irma Gordon of Corvallis will speak at a dinner to be served at seven o'clock at the Pelican cafe.

All members and their guests are cordially invited to hear Dr. Gordon who comes as one of the most winning speakers scheduled in Klamath Falls. Dr. Gordon has lectured extensively since her return from Germany two years ago. She first went to Germany in January, 1932, five months before Adolf Hitler came to power, and left in 1938.

She studied German at the University of Berlin, and has a clear insight into problems which faced Germany, before and during the Hitler regime. She will include in her lecture such discussions as, "How Hitler Came Into Power," and will also tell of labor conditions, living standards, Hitler's attitude towards education and religion, and the attitude of the German people toward Hitler. In a nutshell, Dr. Gordon will attempt to tell the true story of Germany as she has seen it.

Mrs. George Clark is in charge of the calling committee, and those wishing to make reservations should contact her. Dr. Gordon is making a tour of AAUW chapters covering Bend, Klamath Falls, Lakeview, the valley cities, and Marshfield.
