

Eulalona Chapter Hears Wilson Wiley

Daughters of American Revolution Enjoy Formal Dinner at Pelican Cafe Monday Evening

Attorney Wilson S. Wiley addressed the members of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, their husbands and other guests, at the annual dinner, Monday evening, at the Pelican Grille.

Mr. Wiley's subject was "Subversive Activities and American Ideals." He outlined the principles of democracy as embodied in the constitution of these United States of America; the theory that "All men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness"; these, according to the speaker, were the ideas of freedom on which our forefathers established this government under which we live today. Freedom of action, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, freedom to worship according to the dictates of our own conscience, are some of the blessings guaranteed to us by this democratic form of government.

In contrast to these rights of a liberty loving people, Mr. Wiley told of life under totalitarian rule, where there is no free speech, free press, no freedom of worship, but where all lives are regulated and controlled by a dictator who is answerable to no one for his rule.

That these totalitarian nations, including the Nazi, fascist, and communist peoples, are determined to enforce their theories of government on the world and are carrying on a war of aggression to this end, and that the people of the United States must join other democratic nations in preserving a government of the people, by the people, for the people, was made clear by the speaker. Mr. Wiley drew a round of enthusiastic applause when he suggested that saboteurs, fifth columnists, and all other anti-American people in this country should be dealt with summarily.

Mrs. George Logan Black, chapter regent, presided during the dinner, and introduced Mrs. Robert Odell, toastmistress.

Mr. Charles Wood Eberlein responded to the address of welcome from the regent. Mrs. Irene Foster talked briefly of her work with Junior American Citizens group, which she supervises. Mrs. Bert C. Thomas sang two numbers: "Dear Land of Home," by Sibelius, and "Open Your Window to the Morn," by Phillips. Mrs. Elbert Veatch accompanied at the piano.

Opening exercises included salute to the flag, led by Mrs. Harry Goeller; recitation of American's creed, led by Mrs. H. A. Nitschelm; George Washington's prayer, by Mrs. Wilbur A. Jones. The meeting closed with all joining in the singing of "God Bless America," led by Mrs. Thomas, and played by Mrs. Veatch.

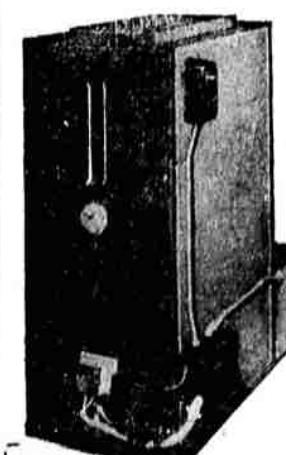
