

SMITH AGAIN PRESIDENT OF SUBURBANITES

SHICK TESTS SET IN SCHOOLS HERE

Under the direction of Klamath County Health Officer Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, a program of Shick testing in the city and county schools is being given to all children who have been immunized for diphtheria. This is the first large scale immunization program presented here for this particular test, Dr. Rozendal stated.

The program will continue through mid-February and between 500 and 600 children are expected to take the test. Cooperation of parents is said to be good, according to Dr. Rozendal. The test is given to determine whether or not the child is immune to diphtheria. And only on written consent of parents.

First of the city schools to be visited was Roosevelt, where 130 out of 280 children had received immunization. A total of 79 were given the Shick tests. At Fairview school where 132 out of 236 pupils had received immunization, 83 students and four teachers received the test.

Flu Epidemic Sweeps Eastern, Southern Areas

An estimated 100,000 persons in the southern and northeastern sections of the United States were suffering Friday from an epidemic of influenza described in most cases as "mildly serious."

In Memphis, Tenn., more than 40,000 cases had been reported and several persons had died of the disease. Twenty thousand pupils of greater Boston schools were absent from classes.

The epidemic was particularly widespread in the south, and schools were closed in many communities. In western Virginia the illness was said to be the worst since 1918.

DRAFTEES TO LEAVE HERE JANUARY 21

SALEM, Jan. 11 (AP)—Transportation schedules for the 351 Oregon men ordered to report to the army induction station at the armory in Portland beginning January 20 were sent today to 55 local boards by Lieutenant Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director.

Seventy-five men will report each on January 20, 21, 22 and 23, with 51 men to report January 24, after physical examination at the induction station, the men probably will be sent either to Camp Murray, Wash., or to Camp Clatsop.

The 14 men of the two Klamath county boards and three men of the Lake county board will leave Klamath Falls by train at 9:45 p. m. Jan. 21, arriving in Portland at 7:40 a. m. the next day. The eight men of Multnomah county board No. 7 will report at the armory at 9:30 a. m.

Foes Criticize President's Bill For British Aid

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—Foes of President Roosevelt's foreign policy criticized today the bill authorizing transfer of American-made military equipment to warring "democracies," and Senator Clark (D-Mo.) declared that the legislation "is simply a bill authorizing the president to declare war."

Administration supporters, however, expressed confidence that the senate would give overwhelming approval to the measure after the house has acted.

When the bill was introduced in the house by Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.), a dozen members jumped up to make remarks, but Speaker Rayburn recognized Rep. Martin of Massachusetts, the republican floor leader.

Martin said that no republican members of congress apparently had been consulted in preparation of the legislation and inquired whether it was to be considered in a non-partisan manner.

Lazarus Accused Of Taking Funds Abroad for Nazis

NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (AP)—A government prosecutor asserted today that Isidore Lazarus, who was sentenced to prison for passport fraud, had carried large sums of money from Germany for such top nazi leaders as Hermann Goering and deposited it in other countries where some "was believed to have been used to finance espionage work and propaganda."

Lazarus, 58 years old, had pleaded guilty to an indictment alleging he had made false statements in obtaining a passport and had used the passport to obtain. He was sentenced to two years in prison and fined \$2500 by Federal Judge Vincent L. Leibell.

Assistant US Attorney Richard J. Burke said that the defendant, "according to his own story, said that he had been engaged in international exchange, under the name Lee Lane, since 1933, when the nazis came into power in Germany, and was a close friend of German leaders."

PINE RIDGE TANK MOVED TO DORRIS

Removal of a big water tank from the fire-ravaged site of Pine Ridge to Dorris has been completed by the O. K. Transfer company of Klamath Falls, according to A. H. Bussman. The city of Dorris purchased the tank from the Forest Lumber company, which operated at Pine Ridge until the big fire of 1939.

The steel tank was taken down in sections, after workmen cut the rivets holding it together. One section was sprung and was taken to a local machine works to be re-rolled so it will fit into the tank when it is reassembled at Dorris.

FEDERAL PROBE OF MILK CONTROL IN OREGON REQUESTED

PORTLAND, Jan. 11 (AP)—State Senator Thomas Mahoney announced last night that he had requested an investigation of the Oregon milk control law by Thurman Arnold, assistant U. S. attorney general.

The senator, sponsor of an unsuccessful initiative to repeal the act, said he wrote Arnold asking him to look into the monopoly phases of the law.

The letter charged, he said, that the milk control board "has arbitrarily and consistently refused" to establish a differential in the retail price of milk sold over the counter and the delivered at the door price.

He wrote that the statute creating the board "specifically mandated" that it find and establish such a price differential.

The "arbitrary price regulation has resulted in curtailing the consumption of milk in Oregon cities," Mahoney asserted.
