destroyers and one "big warship." Only the submarine and one cruiser have been reported sunk.

CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 14 (AP)—Destruction of nine airplanes believed to be German Junkers 87's in a heavy raid Sunday night on Catania, Sicily, was reported today by RAF headquarters.

(Catania is on the east coast of the Italian island of Sicily and near the strait of Sicily where, according to the Italian high command, German dive bombers have joined with the fascist air force in an offensive against British Mediterranean seapower.)

(Junkers 87's are two-seater dive-bombers.)

The communique said three hangars were set on fire, one of them being demolished, in a heavy raid the night of Jan. 12-13.

MRS. FDR WANTS DEFERMENT RULE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (UP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt predicted today selective service headquarters "shortly" will establish a uniform deferment rule for married men living with their wives to correct a situation which she termed unfair.

She felt such married men should be deferred as long as there are enough single men—not yet embarked on their careers and not in the midst of their education—to fill the quotas.

She listed in order of preference for selective service:

Single men who have not started on their careers or who are not in the midst of their education program.

Married men who can support their wives while in service.

Married men whose wives are self-supporting.

KEEZER TO STUDY WAGE CONDITIONS

PORTLAND, Jan. 15 (UP)—A coordinated plan to survey income and wage conditions in the Douglas fir industry has been formulated by the national defense commission, Dr. Dexter M. Keezer, president of Reed college, said Monday.

Keezer has been conducting a preliminary survey for the commission. He said that hearings will be held in key cities throughout the Pacific coast area.

The college president returned by plane from Washington where he conferred with labor department and defense commission officials on the results of his preliminary study. The survey will be completed before March, when most of the contracts between employers and workers expire.

Speed Law

A resolution extending "sincere and lasting wishes" to President Roosevelt "for good fortune and high success in his office" was introduced by house democrats, including Richard Neuberger and Phil Brady of Multnomah county, and two republicans, Angus Gibson and Truman A. Chase of Lane county.

The state highway commission said today it would not introduce any legislation to adopt fixed highway speed limits. Such a measure was introduced yesterday by Senators Lee of Multnomah county, McKay of Marion and Clark of Douglas.

The measure, drafted with the assistance of the commission, will not be either supported or opposed by it.

It would establish limits of 15 miles an hour in school zones, 20 in business districts, 25 in residence districts, and 45 on open highways. It also would shift the burden of proof from the officer to the driver, who would have to prove he was driving safely if found to be exceeding the speed limit.

A state speed control board—the secretary of state, highway commission chairman and the superintendent of state police—could increase or decrease the limits on open highways. Cities and towns would have the same right on their streets and roads.

TAXI-PARKING PUZZLE AGAIN BEFORE DADS

The hope that the solution of Klamath Falls' taxi-parking problem may be in sight was voiced by Mayor John Houston after a lengthy discussion of that same problem at the council meeting last night.

The police committee report had indicated an agreement partially clearing up the situation on South Seventh street—where two taxi stands take up four parking spaces—had been reached, under which the taxi operators were to move one parking space away from the Main street corner.

Fare Cut Seen

The \$100-per-car fee will be continued in 1941, it was indicated, but the police committee was given further time to study the problem of applications for Ninth street stands and the one stand operating on Main street by special dispensation although in violation of the taxi ordinance which rules cabs onto the side streets.

Mayor Houston's hopeful note was that the taxi operators had stated that they would soon install taximeters with a minimum fare low enough that housewives may do their shopping in cabs and leave cars at home.

The council voted adoption of nine of ten recommendations of the council as a whole after perusal bids for city service and materials. The remaining recommendation was amended to give the city contract for oil to the Gilmore Oil company. The previous session had recommended the Texas company's bid but further study indicated Gilmore's lower bid met specifications.

Sign Ordinance Talked

Other recommendations included \$5 per machine per year to the Klamath Stationery committee for monthly service of office equipment; issuance of bench warrants for delinquent holders of "fixless" traffic tickets; action to meet government requirements to secure allotments for airport improvement; confirmation of appointments to the staff of police judge, and installation of additional lights in the council chamber, along with other bids for the year.

A revision of the city's sign ordinance to legalize neon signs approved by city inspectors instead of requiring the National Bureau of Fire Underwriters' label was asked by Glenn Myers, local sign maker who argued before the council that the cost of having locally-made signs inspected by the bureau is prohibitive.

COURT CONSIDERS LIQUOR DEMURRERS

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg Monday took under advisement demurrers charging faulty indictment of four persons charged with liquor law violations. The judge heard arguments presented by E. E. Driscoll, attorney for the four persons involved.

Those indicted are Carlton Wheeler Haynes, charged with maintaining a nuisance and illegal sale; Maizie Walters, Carol Martin and Marshall Claude Spivey, all charged with maintaining a nuisance.

In the demurrers it is contended that the indictments are faulty because insufficient facts were brought before the grand jury.

If Judge Vandenberg overrules the demurrers, the defendants will enter pleas; if they are accepted, the cases will be sent back to the grand jury.
