HEARINGS ON THREE CASES SET BY NLBB

Three national labor relations board hearings have been ordered for the first part of February at lumber operations of Klamath Falls and vicinity. It was announced by local union officials.

On February 3 hearings are to be held at Kesterson Lumber corporation and the Algoma Lumber company. On February 5 a hearing has been called at the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

At Kesterson's the IWA, a CIO affiliate, is petitioning for investigation and certification. At Algoma, the petitioning union is the AFL, officials of which are asking for certification of employees, separation of woods workers and mill workers, and an election to determine the bargaining unit. At Weyerhaeuser the Machinists International union, a craft organization, is petitioning for separation of maintenance men and machinists from other Weyerhaeuser employees.

The AFL will be represented by Presley L. Gill, AFL attorney from Seattle.

Earle Shawe, regional AFL investigator, was expected to arrive in Klamath Falls Tuesday for a fourth hearing, scheduled at Big Lakes Box company operations at Canby, Calif., next Friday, January 17.

Shawe will also study a petition for investigation at the Big Lakes operations in Klamath Falls during his visit.

WARD STAFF TO PREVIEW NEW HOME APPLIANCES

R. R. Proebstel, manager, J. L. Calhoun, department head, and J. D. Cheney, service man of Klamath Falls Montgomery Ward store, are leaving Tuesday for Portland to discuss sales plans for the 1941 M-W electric refrigerators and home appliances review.

CLARA EDITH REAM DIES HERE MONDAY

Mrs. Clara Edith Ream, 66, for the past 23 years a resident of Klamath Falls, died Monday afternoon following an illness of the past two years. Mrs. Ream is survived by her sister, Mrs. Charlotte Agee, with whom she made her home, two brothers, David Lenox of Roseburg, formerly of this city, George Lenox of Klamath Falls, and a half-sister, Mrs. Leona Morin of Alleghany, Ore.

Mrs. Ream's husband, Phillip Ream, died in Roseburg in 1917. For many years he drove a six-horse stage from Roseburg down the Coquille river to Myrtle Point, Coquille and Marshfield. He was well known in Douglas county. Mrs. Ream's parents were David and Sarah Lenox, Oregon pioneers. Mr. Lenox crossed the plains at the age of eight years, accompanied by his parents whose covered wagon was part of a train which left the east in 1843. Mrs. Lenox came with her parents later from Illinois. Both died in Oregon after many years of residence.

Mrs. Ream was born in West Union, Ore., near Portland. Services will be conducted from the Whitlock Funeral Home at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon with the Rev. Cecil C. Brown of the First Baptist church officiating. Mrs. Ream was a member of the church during her life. Final services will be held at Roseburg where burial will take place in the family plot by the side of her husband.
