

CITY HALL OFFICES UNDERGOING CHANGE

You'll have to learn your way around in the city hall these days, with all the moving and switching of offices from one floor to another.

Mayor John Houston has taken over the two small rooms next to the city clerk's offices, on the second floor formerly occupied by the city recreation department. The recreation offices are now located in the reception room formerly used by Mayor Clifton Richmond, and the mayor's private office will now house desks for the city milk and meat inspector, the city building, plumbing, and electrical inspectors.

The recreation secretary has a desk in this room and will handle all phone calls. This will be of great satisfaction to persons having had numerous occasions to call the inspectors, and receiving no answer to their calls when the men are out of the city hall on routine duties.

The room on the first floor, formerly occupied by the four inspectors, is now being renovated for use as police officers' quarters according to Chief of Police Frank Hamm, and will be a welcome addition to the police department. The room may also be used for interviews.

Just what will be done with the basement, occupied by the city engineer, and also the jail, has not yet been announced.

SANITARIAN TO STUDY DRINKING WATER SOURCES

Persons in Klamath county who are concerned over drinking water and the source, are invited to come to the Klamath county health unit and discuss their problem with William Bruce Davis, Klamath county sanitarian. Tests of the water will be made by Davis later.

Davis spent Monday in the Bly and Beatty district, accompanied by Mrs. Myrtle Caldwell, Klamath county health nurse. This was Davis' first visit to that section of the county. He will visit each district in turn.

CRATER PARK GETS HEAVY SNOWFALL

A heavy storm is in progress at Crater Lake national park, according to word received here Wednesday morning, and if the storm continues chains will be required within the park. Five inches of new snow has fallen since 4 p. m. Tuesday, bringing the total to 93 inches at park headquarters.

Visibility was "zero," it was reported.

Skiing is "fair," although a dry powdery snow covers the crust and skis are said to sink in, "some five or six inches." Roads are open to two-way traffic and at the present are passable.

Few Vegetables Needed in Making Nutritious Meals

Small amounts of uncooked vegetables can be combined into vitamin and mineral-rich chowders for one-dish lunches. When preparing the vegetables for dinner, set aside a few uncooked for next day's lunch-eon chowder.

Vegetable Chowder (serves 4 to 6)

Two slices bacon, diced; 1 cup string beans or green peas, 2 cups tomatoes, 1 cup onions, 1 large potato, diced; 1/3 cup celery, 1 cup chopped green peppers, 3 pints vegetable or meat stock, salt and pepper.

Fry bacon until crisp and brown, add vegetables, chopped or cut into small pieces. Add stock and cook slowly until vegetables are tender and season with salt and pepper. Turnips, any of the cabbage family, lima beans or okra may be substituted for any of the above.

The stock for this vegetable chowder can be made by simmering bits of wilted lettuce, onion peels, ends of celery, bean trimmings and pea pods and of course any leftover meat bones or trimmings.

Carrot Soup (serves 4 to 6)

Two bunches carrots, 1 onion, 1 head celery, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon salt, pepper, 3 cups clear stock (of vegetable or meat leftovers), 2 cups milk, parsley, thyme.

Slice carrots, onion and celery. Melt butter. Add vegetables, chopped parsley and thyme. Simmer for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add stock, salt and pepper. Cover and simmer 1 hour. Strain into hot milk and thicken with butter and flour blended together.

Spinach and Sorrel Chowder (serves 4 to 6)

One cup finely shredded raw spinach, 1/2 cup shredded raw sorrel, 3 large potatoes, 1 leek, 1 head lettuce, 3 stalks celery, 3 teaspoons salt, 4 tablespoons butter, 8 cups boiling water, 1 tablespoon mixed herbs.

Shred sorrel, spinach, lettuce and celery; cut leek into thin slices. Melt butter and cook vegetables in butter for 12 minutes, but do not brown. Peel potatoes. Combine all vegetables, add salt and boiling water. Simmer for 1 hour. Crush potatoes. Add herbs. Simmer 7 minutes more. Serve at once with croutons.

RED CROSS LAUDED FOR BRITISH AID

Thousands of letters of appreciation for garments and surgical dressings have been received by the American Red Cross from Britain. Excerpts from them are most interesting. From Hilde Marchant, tiny, pert, pretty Yorkshire girl, a newspaper woman, comes word:

"Within the bonds of her neutrality America still finds an opportunity for mercy. To Britain comes the blessing of the American Red Cross. Their greatest work is in repairing the human damage that has torn the east end (of London). I went round the clothing centers to see

how useful American clothes were to the homeless.

"There is one thing about all the supplies that has a real touch of delicacy about it. Everything they send is new—brand new, still with the makers' tickets on, still in cellophane. This is a gesture to the people who receive them that is greatly liked. They come out of the rooms with their bundles as if they have been to the outfitters, not the pawnbroker's. There is no sense of taking away something old, cast-off, that nobody wanted.

"One woman told us that there was a first call on all the American things for just that reason. They are labelled simply 'America to Britain'. Complete sets of clothes are wrapped in linen, with the name of the center that has sent them—from Idaho, from Missouri. When we tell the children their things come from

America they are delighted. They look at them, want to put them on straight away, and trot out of the place boastfully." (Received December, 1940).
