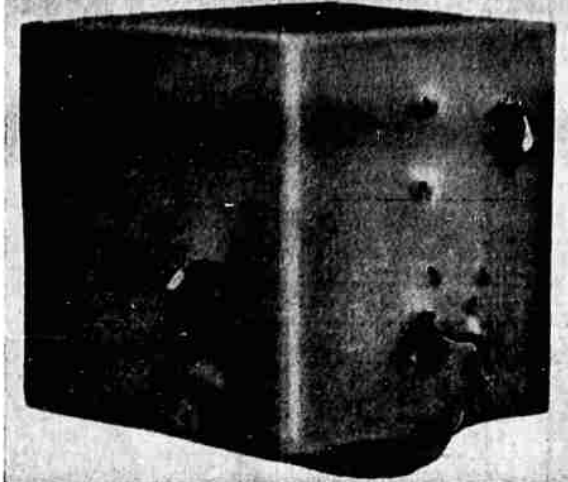

HEAVY SNOW FALLS ON PASS HIGHWAYS

A minimum temperature of 30 degrees was reported by the U. S. weatherman who found, along with other residents of Klamath Falls, a heavy snowfall when he woke Wednesday morning. A total of .14 inches

of moisture fell before 8 a. m. and snow continued throughout the day. Precipitation total for the stream year is 5.38 inches. The snow extended throughout eastern Oregon, and an additional six and one-half inches on Sun mountain brought the total to 55 inches. Snow covered the length of The Dalles-California highway. Snow fell on the Willamette pass and covered the road from one mile west of the tunnel to the junction of The Dalles-California highway. The Greensprings and Lakeview highways were snow covered with five inches of new snow on Quartz mountain with a probable depth of around 10 inches. Chains should be carried. While eastern Oregon had snow, heavy rains were reported falling throughout the valley sections, especially in Salem, Grants Pass and Medford.
