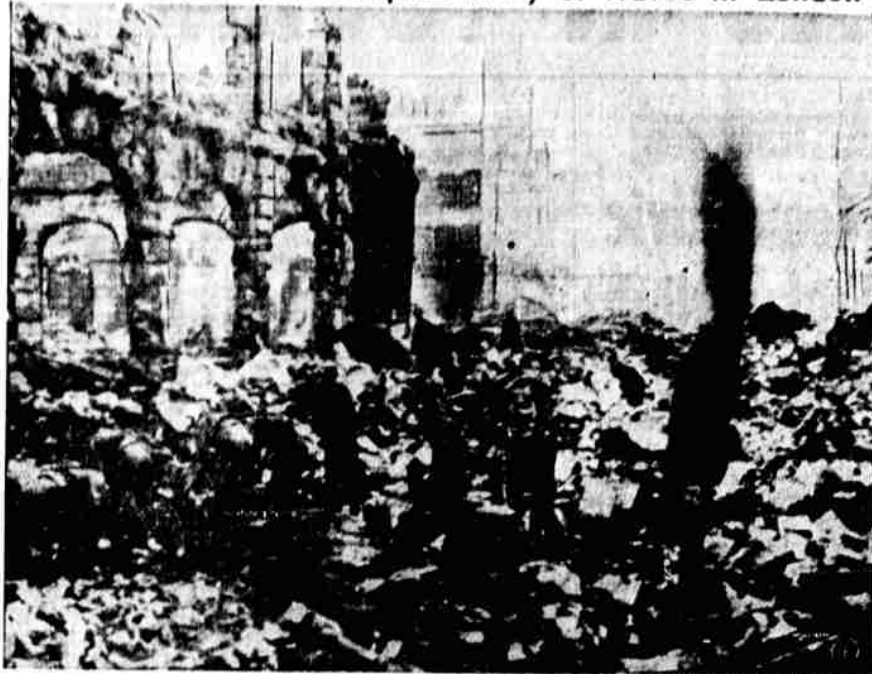

ALASKAN INDIANS ASK 20 MILLION

SEATTLE, Jan. 15 (AP)—Two Alaskan Indians reversed Tuesday the route over which white men came to allegedly ruin their hunting and fishing grounds, and headed toward Washington to press for \$20,000,000 from the government.

The two natives of southeastern Alaska, Roy Peratovich and William L. Paul, said they were going to the national capital in connection with long-pending claim in behalf of 5000 members of the Haida and Thlinget tribes. The natives contend the land was taken from them by the whites and founded as a hunting and fishing grounds.

At the same time, a Washington state court decision showed how white men's laws and civilization are complicating life for the redmen.

The state supreme court denied that a treaty of 1855 gave Indians the right to fish without restriction in waters outside their reservations.

The court affirmed the conviction of Sampson Tulle, a Yakima tribesman, for selling fish which were caught without a state license at the tribe's age-old fishing grounds on the Columbia river. The high court split five to three.

The court quoted the 86-year-old treaty provision that the Indians could fish "at all usual and accustomed places, in common with citizens of the territory."
