

BACK PAY AWARDED IN ALTURAS CASE

Back pay for R. R. Kernan, employee of the E. E. Crom Lumber company, Alturas, Calif., was awarded Wednesday in a stipulation handed down by Earle Shawe of Seattle, NLRB trial examiner. Shawe made the stipulation at a hearing conducted at Alturas.

Kernan was awarded \$100, in payment for time lost after he was discharged last fall. He is an officer of the Alturas local No. 2604 of the AFL lumber and sawmill workers, which union charged the Crom Lumber company with discrimination.

The company was represented by District Attorney Charles Lederer.

Shawe will conduct an NLRB hearing at the Klamath county courthouse Friday, investigating charges filed against the Big Lakes Box company operations at Canby, Calif.

SLIP-COVER CLASS BEING CONDUCTED BY EXTENSION

A slip-cover class is being conducted this week by the Oregon State college extension service in the basement of the Methodist church. Women from seven different communities in Klamath county are learning to make slip covers for different types of chairs and will then return to their communities to help other women cover their chairs and davenports.

Lois Lutz, extension specialist in home furnishings from Oregon State college, is in charge of the instruction. Miss Lutz held a meeting in Klamath Falls, January 6 to teach these leaders how to measure their chairs for material and to discuss various types of materials and colors which are suitable for slip covers.

This week the women are cutting their material, fitting it to the chair, making welting and finishing the cover under Miss Lutz' supervision. TEMPERATURE 26 AS SNOW FALLS HERE WEDNESDAY

Sub-freezing weather was reported throughout the Klamath basin Thursday morning when the temperature was reported at 26 degrees. A maximum during the day was 34 degrees. Snow fell throughout the day but melted rapidly on the warm ground.

One inch of new snow fell on the Willamette pass and packed snow is reported on the road from the tunnel to the junction of the Dalles-California highway. Two inches of fresh snow fell on the Greensprings, however the road has been well sanded by the Oregon State highway department. Two inches of new snow fell on Sun mountain summit bringing the total to 55 inches. Chains were advised as a number of accidents have resulted from the slick pavement.

The McKenzie, Diamond Lake and Mt. Hood Loop roads remain closed, according to the highway department.
