JURY SELECTED IN HUNTING FATALITY

ALTURAS—The selecting of a jury in the trial of Police Radviero, charged with involuntary manslaughter, was started in superior court here this morning before Judge A. K. Wylie. Radviero, who while hunting deer in the Fandango section on September 17, shot and killed his hunting companion, K. P. Ahl, mistaking him for a deer. Radviero, arrested at the time by Sheriff John Sharp, pleaded no guilty, posted a \$1000 cash bond and was released until January 15, the time set for his trial. District Attorney Charles Lederer is prosecuting and James Theisen of Fresno, is defending Radviero.

Trucks, Mule Trains Used In Greek Supply Columns

WITH THE GREEK ARMY IN ALBANIA, Jan. 16 (P)—Truck drivers with rickety old cars and farmers with trains of stubborn mules are meeting transportation problems as fantastic as any army ever faced to keep food and ammunition flowing to their comrades in the Greek front lines.

Day after day, this army of supply is getting through to the army of fighting men whose advances steadily lengthen the lines of communication north into Albania.

The determined men, the ancient trucks and the balky mules are doing their part in the war through ice and slush and ankle-deep mud, through mountains as wild as the American Rockies, in country where the best roads are only "ruts frozen on the mountainsides."

The drivers are men like Mike.

He is married, has one child, owns and operates two buses in peacetime, and has his own car, a 12-year-old American flivver.

The day Italian troops invaded Greece, Mike was on his way to the front as a supply driver, nursing along his rattling sedan. His buses also were put into service. And he has been at it ever since.

I saw him under the hood of the old car, working furiously with an engine that sputtered like an outboard motor with the hiccupps.

He's like the others—the "spirit" behind the Greek fighting line, but he'd just laugh if anyone told him so.

He told me, after tying down the hood with baling wire, that he had two hours of sleep in the last three days—driving 400 miles a day on roads where, in some places, a mistake would send the sedan hurtling 1000 feet down a mountainside.

And when the war is over?

"There's just one thing I want to do," he declared. "I want to buy a brand new car—with a radio, just like the Americans."

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NYA PROJECTS FOR KLAMATH OUTLINED

In addition to paid work-experience, free vocational courses in shop and technical trades, stenography and other professional work will be provided for young men and young women working on NYA projects at Klamath Falls, according to word received from Earl I. Rice, NYA area director.

After selection, these courses will be requisitioned by local school district boards, drawing upon funds made available to the state board for vocational education, for instruction of defense workers. Courses are organized to extend training supplementary to project experience or to give preparatory training as an aid to occupational adjustment and to provide instruction designed to increase civic or vocational intelligence. The need for increased industrial production warrants expansion of the NYA program. Several new projects and related vocational courses will be initiated in this area. Another youth

service becomes available to NYA workers with the inauguration of a statewide NYA health program to provide physical examinations and to promote correction of health defects.

Citizens age 16 to 24 inclusive, of Klamath and Lake counties, can secure further information about these new services at the Oregon State Employment offices at Klamath Falls and Lakeview. Mr. Rice will be available for interview at the Klamath Falls office on Thursday, January 16, and at Lakeview courthouse on Friday, January 17.
