SKIING IMPROVED AT CRATER LAKE

Ten inches of new snow at Crater Lake national park brought the total of snow depth to 101 inches at park headquarters, turning buildings and trees into a veritable fairyland of beauty. Twelve inches of dry, powdery snow has fallen over the normal pack and skiing conditions were reported "improved," according to Don C. Fisher, ranger, who contacted park officials Friday morning.

A maximum temperature of 26 degrees, and a minimum of 24 was reported for the past 24 hours. A light southwest wind was blowing Friday morning, the sky was overcast but broken in places. Visibility at the lake was poor due to low, overhanging clouds.

Roads into the park are open to two-way traffic with the exception of several places where it was reported quite narrow. Heavy snowplows are working to open these spots to full two-way traffic in preparation for weekend travel. Chains are advised on all roads in the park, and required on the road between Annie Springs and the rim.

FUNERAL SET FOR WELL KNOWN LUMBER EMPLOYEE

Funeral services for Clarence Vincent Schultz, 38, who died at Hillside hospital Wednesday following a three weeks' illness, were held at 3:30 o'clock Friday afternoon from Ward's Klamath funeral home with the Rev. A. Theodore Smith of the First Presbyterian church officiating. Remains were to be shipped south to Oakland, Calif., Friday night where cremation was to take place.

Mr. Schultz resided in Klamath Falls for the past 17 years and was a highly respected and well known employee of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Schultz of Weyerhaeuser, both of whom have died in recent years. Mr. Schultz suffered a severe attack of influenza recently and his death was due to complications following pneumonia. He is survived by his wife, Mildred, one son, Edward, and a daughter, Ruth, all of this city, one brother, Freeman Schultz of Algoma, and a sister, Mrs. Verma MacArthur of Venice, Calif. Mr. Schultz was a member of Klamath lodge No. 77, AF&AM, and services were directed by the officers of the Masonic lodge.
