

# LEGION AUXILIARY SEEKS SPY CURBS

Stronger laws to protect America from its internal enemies will be urged by the American Legion auxiliary during the new session of congress, according to Mrs. Hal Ogle, legislative chairman of the local auxiliary unit. The auxiliary will especially urge sharp restriction of immigration, expansion of the federal bureau of investigation and continuance of the Dies committee.

Elimination of existing immigration quotas and the setting up of a complete ban against all immigrants seeking permanent residences in the United States during the present emergency will be asked. The auxiliary will also urge that no alien visitors who cannot return to their native lands be admitted.

The auxiliary's support will be given to the Legion's demand for continuance of the Dies committee, with increased appropriations necessary for complete investigation of un-American activities and to prepare evidence for prosecution and for drafting of legislation to prevent such activities.

Additional appropriation for the federal bureau of investigation will be urged by the auxiliary in order that the personnel of the bureau can be expanded to cope with sabotage, espionage and subversive activities. This

is considered essential for the protection of nation defense industries.

All national defense legislation supported by the American Legion also will have the full support of the auxiliary's 500,000 women, Mrs. Ogle said. The auxiliary will join the Legion in renewed request for extension of government protection to widows and orphans of deceased World war veterans on the same basis as it is given to those of veterans of all other wars. Real preference for veterans in government employment is another major plank in the auxiliary's 1941 legislative program.

## Three Killed in Chinatown Fire

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (AP)—Three persons died yesterday as a fire swept through three buildings in the heart of Chinatown, a section marked by fatal blazes over a long period of years.

The fire, which broke out shortly after noon, was quickly brought under control but not before the lower east side section of Manhattan was covered with a cloud of black smoke.

Inspecting the scene after recovery of three bodies, Assistant District Attorney Jacob J. Rosenblum called the 6-8 Doyers street building "one of the rottenest hell holes I ever saw."

"The stairs, walls, partitions and the under part of the stairways were made of what is known as matchboards," he said.

# Tax Law Called Ideal Field For Budding Career Women

WASHINGTON.—The capital had never heard of Marion J. Harron until a group of educators included her in their list of "Ten Most Accomplished Women in the United States Born Since 1900."

The other nine names include such widely publicized ones as Clara Booth, Helen Hayes, Anne Lindbergh and Alice Marble. But, until she was picked for this honor, Miss Harron's name had almost never been in print. Her reaction to overnight fame is "Since this happened, I can't get any work done."

ONLY WOMAN ON TAX BOARD

Miss Harron is the only woman on the federal board of tax appeals. She shares the bench with 15 men. Most people need a lawyer to fill out their own income tax forms properly, but the cases Miss Harron and her colleagues review are a jungle of legal entanglements.

As evidence that she keeps up her hand of the work, the supreme court this year upheld a decision she had written, involving an important principle of taxation.

A dark-haired, good-looking woman in her thirties, Miss Harron has unusual mental equipment, but she thinks a lot more

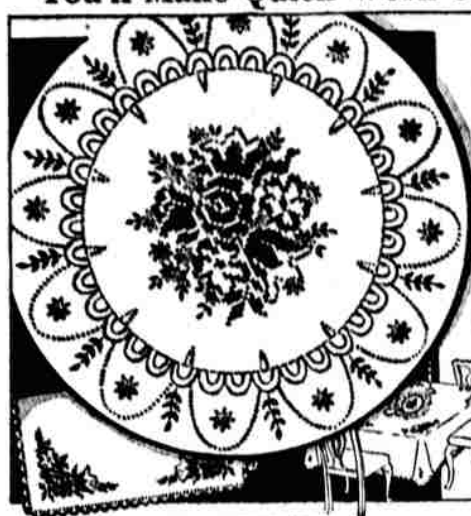
## Sprague River

"Most women are taxpayers, and there's no reason why women lawyers should not specialize in taxation. First, however, they should learn to use the tools of a lawyer, in general practice."

Miss Harron got her Phi Beta Kappa key when she graduated from the University of California at 21. Two years later, she had her degree in law and was admitted to the bar. She taught for a while, and worked in the legal division of NRA. After that she pounded the pavements in New York to get a job which would give her experience in handling trusts, estates and taxation.

She joined a Wall Street firm at the bottom of the depression and was assigned to untangle the legal knots of corporation reorganizations.

She says "If one woman opens the way, others can follow. In my case, Annabelle Matthews, who was the first woman appointed to the federal board of tax appeals, paved the way for my appointment as her successor. Women should not hesitate to push into fields that have been considered 'men's fields.' If they are able, they will make a go of it."

**MUST LEARN TO GET ALONG**

Even though she has not broken new trails, Miss Harron has had to swallow her pride when she met rebuffs because men resented her. She says "If a woman feels she's discriminated against, she is half licked. She must learn to cooperate with her male colleagues, do her job and go on." Miss Harron is extremely modest about her own accomplishments and that has
