CASCADES GET 10-INCH SNOW; CHAINS URGED

Heaviest snow of the season fell throughout this section of Oregon and the Cascades were blanketed with a new coat of 10 inches, according to the radio reports given by the state highway department. In Klamath Falls a three-inch snowfall was recorded by the US weatherman.

Motorists traveling north, east or west were advised to use chains out of Klamath Falls. They are not needed

south of Macdoel on the Weed highway.

At Odell summit 10 inches of new snow brought the total to 44. A Friday morning survey showed. Heaviest fall was reported from Sand creek where a total of 64 inches on Sun mountain was shown after a 14-inch snowfall during the night. A light snow was reported falling Friday morning.

Packed snow was reported from the Willamette pass tunnel to the junction of the Dalles-California highway. On the Santiam pass five inches of new snow was reported and the road is "slick."

A minimum temperature of 32 degrees kept the precipitation .30 fairly well intact until late morning when slush hampered traffic. Total precipitation to date is 5.79 inches, passing for the first time during the season the normal figure which is 5.80 inches. Last year at this time the figure stood at 7.58 inches.

LAKE CHAMBER AD CAMPAIGN TO CONTINUE

LAKEVIEW—The Lake County chamber of commerce held its annual meeting last night at the Hunter Hot Springs hotel. The reports of the committee chairmen revealed a wide variety of activities during the past year.

The advertising committee reported that it issued 35,000 pieces of advertising literature for distribution. The suggestion was made that in 1941 the chamber take colored motion pictures of the scenic and recreational attractions of the county.

The forestry committee reported that during 1940, 16,980 acres of private timber lands and 4191 acres of national forest timber were cut on the sustained yield basis. About half of the timber on the private acreage was removed, thus leaving a valuable stand for future generations. The committee reported that only a small acreage of private timber was not cut on the sustained yield basis.

The highway commission reported the completion of the Fremont highway and the allocation funds for the completion of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway. The reconstruction and paving of Lake county secondary state highways will commence this spring unless the legislature should divert the funds to the city streets in accordance with the request of the League of Oregon Cities.

The city council and the chamber were complimented by many members for having erected a large electric sign over the main street. The county court and the Lakeview water commission were publicly thanked for their cooperation during the past year.

The wild life committee reported that the land board and state game commission have reached an agreement over the proposed sale of state school lands at the mouth of Ana river to the state game commission for a public hunting ground. The legislature which is now in session will be asked to slash the cost of antelope permits so that both resident and non-resident hunters can be encouraged to keep down the size of the herds, which are rapidly increasing.
