## F-H Clubs Know Protective Foods Safeguard Health

Recently, six young farm girls, 4-H club members, received awards of \$200 scholarships each for outstanding records in purchasing, preparation and preservation of food. Julius Ruthenburg of Evansville, Ind., donated the prizes for his company, and the contest was conducted jointly by the National Committee on Boys' and Girls' club work and extension services of state agricultural colleges and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

**Protective Foods**  
Here is a list of protective foods emphasized in 4-H club work, and suitable as a guide to a good daily diet for any growing boy or girl.  
Milk ..... 1 1/2 pints to 1 quart  
Butter ..... 1 to 3 servings  
Fruits and vegetables ..... 4 to 5 servings  
A good balance is:  
1 serving potato  
1 serving citrus fruit, tomatoes, or raw cabbage  
1 serving green or yellow colored vegetable  
Whole-grain bread or cereals 1 to 2 servings  
Eggs, meat, fish, cheese, dried beans, or peas, 2 servings  
Total liquids (water, milk, soup, beverages), 2 quarts or more.  
Cod liver oil, 1 teaspoon (especially in winter when you cannot afford plenty of whole

### AGAINST LEASE-LEND

**KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., (To the Editor)**—The time has come for those who believe in American liberties to oppose any force that seeks to destroy them. Insidious British war propaganda would have us believe they are fighting our war, but the truth of the matter is, England never fought for anyone but herself. Look through the pages of your history books if you doubt that! Actually she is now only seeking to cover the fact she still has seven billion dollars in securities in this country with which she could purchase from us the war materials she needs. **HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 18 (UP)**—Orson Welles Friday night called the gardenia-eating Dolores Del Rio the most beautiful woman in the world and indicated he hoped to marry her.

The man from mars cannot do that for at least a year. Miss Del Rio received her divorce only this morning from Cedric Gibbons, the movie art director, whom she charged with mental cruelty. She said he was "cold and indifferent."

The 26-year-old Welles, who scared the eastern half of the nation with his martian invasion radio broadcast a couple of years ago and who wrote, produced, directed and acted in his first motion picture during most of last year, met Miss Del Rio soon after he came to Hollywood.

She had separated by then from Gibbons. Welles became her almost constant escort.

Miss Del Rio, who was born in 1905 in Durango, Mexico, and christened Dolores Ansunolo, has been a top-flight movie star since 1925 and has been eating flower blossoms, with particular emphasis on gardenias ever since.

Her marriage to Gibbons, who designs the fancy movie sets for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, lasted for 10 years. To court Miss Del Rio brought Fay Wray as a corroborating witness and told Judge Thurmond Clarke that for the last three years her husband had been indifferent and cold.

The judge awarded Miss Del Rio a decree which becomes effective in one year.
