

Bundles for Britain Luncheons Started

"Galloping" Parties Scheduled for Early Winter In Klamath Falls as Original Party Under Way

Klamath Falls women, who are interested in the success of the local unit of "Bundles for Britain," are anticipating the gay rounds of "galloping luncheons," the principal one of which was given Saturday afternoon of this week at the home of Mrs. Charles G. Hovey, with Mrs. Hovey and Mrs. Peter A. Albertson as hostesses.

This is the way it works, and in the end all money is turned over to the local unit which has pledged a total of \$2000 with which they hope to buy a feeding unit for use in England. The eight then entertain four persons each, and the four entertain, in turn, for two persons. The original sixteen have pledged a party for eight others which will involve one hundred and twenty-eight persons—and so it goes.
