League Slates Meet

Local Men To Speak To Women's Group Monday Afternoon

Women of the county will have the opportunity to become better informed about the present unemployment compensation law at the general meeting of the League of Women Voters to be held next Monday afternoon, January the twentieth, at two o'clock in the small room of the city library.

Mrs. Leo Sagehorn, chairman of the government and economic welfare study group, which is in charge of the afternoon's program, has planned a very interesting and informative meeting during which two local men will talk on various aspects of this law.

Mr. Jack Almetzer, director of the Oregon state unemployment compensation service will discuss the law in its present form. Mr. A. L. Rice, business manager of the local painters' union, affiliate of AFL, and a voluntary organizer of AFL, will discuss the amendments which his labor group will ask the present legislature to make.

Some of the many questions which will be answered during the discussion are: Do you know what the Oregon unemployment compensation law is, and how long it has been operating? Do you know who is eligible for the benefits of the fund? What is meant by experience rating? What is meant by seasonal exemptions to employers? These last two questions are controversial clauses of the law; it is believed that labor will wish to have them amended.

Since many women are unfamiliar with the operation of this law, the league feels that you will find it well worth your while to hear these explanatory talks. Anyone, whether a member of the league or not, is invited to attend.

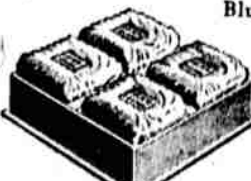
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
