Theatre Personality

Among those employees long identified with the Klamath Theatre organization is Roy Wells, now Pelican theatre maintenance supervisor. Roy joined this organization in 1925 at which time he played a clarinet with Harry Borel's Pine Tree Theatre orchestra. Later he served as organist in that same theatre from time to time. His previous theatrical experience was varied but all musical in nature. From 1913 Roy was on the road with travelling bands, road shows and even carnivals. He recalls having been stranded with an entire troupe in Butte, Montana, and having had the same experience in Taft, (near Bakersfield) California. Among road shows with which he travelled were The Golden Gate Revue and The Black and White Revue.

Because his professional musical career was entirely theatrical he abandoned it with the advent of talking pictures, preferring to remain in Klamath Falls rather than to follow the life of a travelling bandsman. However, music remains his favorite hobby and he spends much time each week at the Pelican theatre during those hours when the theatre is dark. He is an ardent sports spectator, following baseball, football, wrestling, etc., during their respective seasons.

Condemnation proceedings were instituted Friday by the state highway commission against property owners of the Wocus district in order to secure right of way for the proposed new Rabbit flat cutoff on the Dalles-California highway north of the city.

Three suits ask that the court set a reasonable sale price for the property, appropriate the land and declare the commission owners in fee simple.

The new cutoff, part of an extensive re-routing program for highway 97 which was begun with the 13-mile Lobert stretch starting at Modoc point, is scheduled to cut directly across the flat about one-quarter mile west of the present road.
