

WONDERLAND GROUP PLANS ADVERTISING

LAKEVIEW—The Lake council of the Shasta Cascade Wonderland association held its January meeting here Friday night with County Chairman Lloyd Ogle presiding. Tom Stanley of Redding, association manager, was present and outlined the advertising projects for the coming year.

The nine counties have been divided into twelve distinct areas and illustrated booklets will be issued by the association covering each of the twelve districts. This plan is preferred to advertising literature which attempts to cover all of the nine counties. This will be supplemented by pamphlets featuring the ski courses and the hunting and fishing areas within the Wonderland.

Lake county expects to erect a suitable marker at the boundary between Deschutes and Klamath counties on the Fremont highway and at the Harney-Lake county line on the Lakeview-Burns highway for the purpose of informing the tourists that they are entering the Shasta Cascade Wonderland.

DRAFT DIRECTORS PLAN TO INSURE DRAFTEES' JOBS

SALEM, Jan. 20 (P)—Lieut. Col. Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director, said Saturday that state employment and selective service officials would meet this week to institute a job-assuring program for men drafted into military service.

Under the program, the commanding officer will notify the state employment service 30 days before a draftee is to be discharged. The state bureau then will attempt to return him to his old job, find him new employment or refer him to the state vocational educational department for training in some trade.

National guardsmen and reserve officers eventually will be included in the program, Wooton said.

AFL VOTES TO CHANGE NAME OF COUNCIL

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 20 (AP)—Delegates to the fifth annual convention voted yesterday

to change the name of the AFL Oregon-Washington Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers to the Northwestern Lumber and Sawmill Workers Council.

The action marked the convention's close. Secretary Kenneth Davis of

Portland explained the change was necessary because northern California, Idaho and Montana workers have joined the council since its organization several years ago.

He predicted that New Mexico

and Arizona workers would soon become members.

The convention also approved a 50-cent monthly assessment against members of all affiliated locals for creation of a "defense fund." The assessment, recom-

mended by the executive board, will run for six months.

Davis explained the council hoped to create a \$500,000 fund for its parent organization, the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, to fight anti-

trust indictments and assist striking locals.
