

# JUNIOR C OF C FOUNDER'S DAY MEET TUESDAY

# 470 CHECK IN AT CRATER LAKE PARK

One hundred and twenty-four cars, carrying 470 persons, visited Crater Lake national park Sunday according to a check made by Don C. Fisher, ranger, stationed during the day at the park entrance.

Of this total, 91 cars and 352 persons entered through the Klamath gate, and 33 cars and 118 came from Medford. A check with the Klamath entrance showed 76 cars carrying 290 persons came for sports, and 15 cars with 62 persons to enjoy the winter sights. From Medford, 31 cars and 80 persons drove to the park to take part in sports, and 12 cars and 38 persons for the trip.

The park was overcast during the day with a light afternoon snow falling. No accidents were reported on the roads.

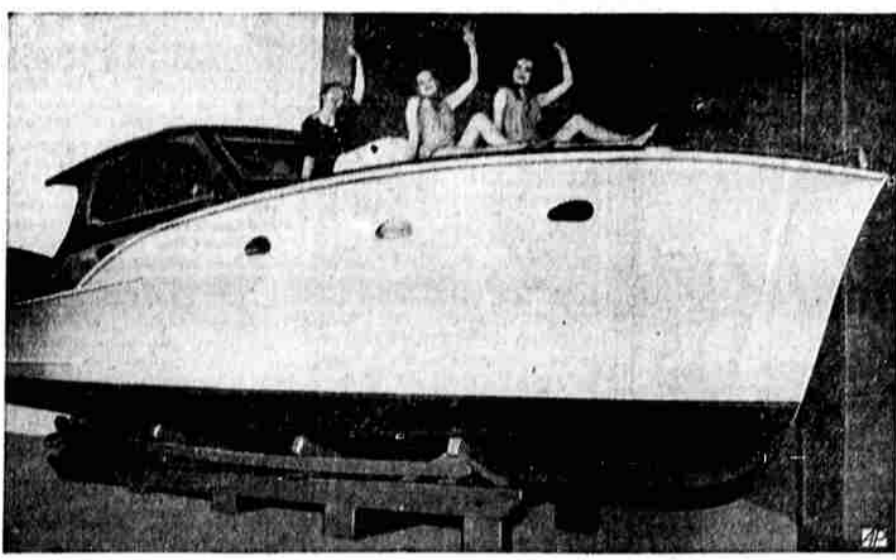
It is said that poetry has the power to condense into a dozen words, thoughts that prose would require a hundred words to express.

# Economists Predict Boom For '41, Real Purchasing Power, Less Unemployment

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (UP)—Government economists predicted last week national prosperity during 1941 will surpass the fabulous "boom year" of 1929. Defense spending will be primarily responsible.

National income will be about the same as 1929, but, because of lower prices, "real purchasing power" will be about 10 to 15 per cent higher, the bureau of agricultural economics said.

Bureau economists, who have correctly forecast every economic trend for more than 20 years, said although the nation is starting a rapid rise in prosperity "there is little basis for expecting a price rise of inflationary proportion in the near future."

New defense jobs largely have been responsible for raising non-agricultural employment, excluding the military, to the highest point since 1929. Prices received by farmers are increasing and total income this year may be the highest in 11 years, the bureau said.

The bureau estimated 5,000,000 more persons will be employed this year than in 1929. The estimate includes 3,000,000 more in the military services, trade and industry and 2,000,000 more on federal relief projects.

The economists said unemployment in 1941 will average about half that of 1940. They estimated that more than 2,000,000 persons found jobs in private employment between March and November, when 6,000,000 still were unemployed.

The income of industrial workers, just getting under way, was the highest in the final quarter of 1940 for any comparable period since 1929, the bureau said. Farm income likewise was at a 10-year high.

While industrial workers will profit by increased armament exports in 1941, farmers can expect no substantial improvement in their export situation, it was said. The value of farm exports has been reduced more than 60 per cent by the war.

The economists said they had heard the British blockade may be modified to permit shipments of selected foodstuffs to some areas of continental Europe and that British purchases of American farm products may be increased under "new methods of financing which are now being considered."

Reflecting increased employment and payrolls as a result of defense spending, living costs are rising, the bureau reported. Wholesale commodity prices have climbed steadily since last August and are now the highest since outbreak of the European war.

# GRAND JURY RECONSIDERS MURDER CASE

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg on Monday over-ruled demurrers to indictments in two involuntary manslaughter cases, but sustained objections to the indictment of Joe Kirk on murder charges and ordered the case resubmitted when the grand jury meets Wednesday.

The judge pointed out that the objection to the Kirk indictment was based on a question of form and that this could be avoided through resubmission. Kirk is accused of murdering Leonard John, an Indian, at Bonanza.

Indictments upheld were those brought against Ralph Acheson Hatfield and Thomas Wilcox Rhodes, charged with involuntary manslaughter. Judge Vandenberg sustained a demurrer against the indictment of Clino Roper on a morals charge. This was also ordered resubmitted.

Several criminal cases have been set for trial in Judge Vandenberg's court.

These include: State versus Q. A. Bailey, January 29; state versus Dick Lynch and Lee Swope, January 31; State versus Tex Williams, February 4, and state versus McKechnie, February 5.

# PRESIDENT OF OREGONIAN BOARD DIES SUNDAY

PORTLAND, Jan. 20 (UP)—Mrs. Kate P. Hebard, 67, president of the Oregonian Publishing company, died yesterday of a heart attack.

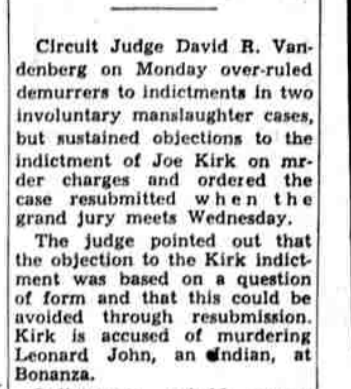
She was the daughter of Henry L. Pittock, who established the Oregonian as a daily morning newspaper. Mrs. Hebard, who served as her father's secretary in the 1890's, was elected president of the company in February, 1939, when a 20-year trust established by her father's will expired.

With the expiration of the trust, heirs to the Pittock and Harvey Scott estates took over management of the company and named Mrs. Hebard president. Scott was associated with Pittock for many years as editor of the Oregonian.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday morning. Survivors include the widow, Lockwood Hebard, and three sisters, Mrs. Caroline P. Leadbetter, Mrs. Susan P. Emery and Mrs. Louise P. Gantenberg.

# Klamath County Represented In U. S. Child Welfare League

Through the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of Oregon Klamath county is being represented for the first time in the Child Welfare League of America, it was announced this week by Mrs. Myrtle C. Dalziel of Portland, state director of the society.

The BGA society, which is represented in this county by Mrs. Edward A. Geary of Klamath Falls, is the only agency in Oregon and one of a comparatively small number in the northwest qualifying for full membership in the league, which is an alliance of organizations caring for children in the U. S. and Canada. The society is noted for its medical program, efficient staff, and its discrimination in finding homes suited to the particular needs of the child.

Working with the cooperation of the state public welfare commission and the assistance of the Portland Community Chest, the society has a board of trustees and women's auxiliary with an honorary board member in every county; a state director, a case work supervisor, and a professional case work staff.

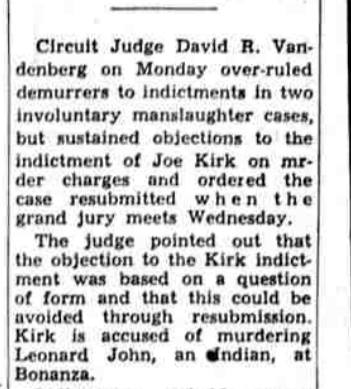
