BAND PROGRAM FOR YEAR SET BY NEW BOARD

An active program for the Klamath Falls municipal band was outlined by members of the newly appointed band commission Monday. Commission members said they are anxious to fulfill the wishes of Mayor John Houston that the band give valuable service to the community in the coming year. Charles Stanfield of the high school music department has been elected band director, according to announcement from Harold Merryman, chairman of the band commission. Merryman said Stanfield has plans for concerts and programs the people of the community will not want to miss. It is planned to hold concerts in various parts of the city for the benefit of different districts.

A tentative site for a bandstand in Moore park has been selected. James Swansen Sr., who is working on this plan, stated he hopes to cooperate with the park and recreation boards in putting this project over.

Arrangements have been made to change band practice on every Monday night from Fremont school to the band room at the high school. The first high school practice will be held February 3. The entire band commission will meet at that time with the band. It is hoped to build the band to 40 members and to dress the personnel in "classy" fashion. Anyone interested in playing should be at the February meeting, starting at 7:30 p. m.

Along with the selection of Merryman as chairman, the other members have been assigned to duties as follows: James Foster, secretary; Ray Biggers, in charge of band members and director and assistant director in charge; Chet Smith, manager; James Swansen, public relations and contact man between the city council, park commission and band commission.

Bids have been asked from men's stores of the city on new uniforms for the band. No purchases of any kind will be made outside the city, it was stated. Merryman said that the commission wants to thank Fred Glover and Ray Coopey as manager and director in the past period, for the efforts given by them to give Klamath Falls a good city band.
