KUHS Makes 23 Points In 2nd Half

HOOP CLINIC
Klamath high's first basketball clinic, free to everyone, will be held Wednesday night at the KUHS gym.

Coach Dutch French, following suggestions from the Quarterback club, has arranged a demonstration of individual and team fundamentals to be staged by the Pelican varsity. The show will start at 7:30 p. m.

Klamath hoop fans should take advantage of this chance to look into the technicalities of the game, as more will be shown than just the style of play used by the Klamathites. French plans to demonstrate the Oregon and Oregon State offenses and defenses, giving comparisons.

The fast and slow break, individual fundamentals and team fundamentals will be analyzed. A loudspeaker will be hooked up for a running explanation throughout the demonstrations. Two full teams will be on the floor, but will be broken down during part of the exhibition for purposes of illustration. Fans can ask questions and their individual problems will be ironed out.

The whole show is being held for the purpose of educating the Klamath basketball public, who, by the way, sadly need an injection of basketball fever.

The two Medford-Klamath games at Medford, for example, were witnessed by capacity houses, French reports upon his return from the Rogue valley junket. The Medford gym is slightly smaller than Klamath's, but it was jammed both nights.

Illinois Professional Wades Through Rain To Win \$1000 Top Money From Harry Cooper

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Trim, square-shouldered Johnny Revolta pocketed \$1000 and the San Francisco match open play golf title and headed for new fields today.

The Evanston, Ill., professional, playing streamlined golf under the worst possible weather conditions, rolled up the most one-sided count in the 11-year history of the tournament to defeat Harry Cooper of Chicago, 7 and 6, in the finals Sunday.

He hacked sensational sub-par golf out of a course flooded by rain. Much of the match was played in a downpour. The greens were covered with water and a lake formed on one fairway.

In the morning round Revolta posted a 33-36—69, compared to par figures of 36-36—72 for the Presidio course. Cooper had a 35-37—72. Revolta was two up at the ninth and three up at the eighteenth.

He toured the third nine in 35 against Cooper's 39 to hold a seven up margin at the 27th. As runnerup, Cooper won \$500. Tony Perma of Dayton, O., won \$425 third money.

The defending champion, Jimmy Demaret, Houston, Texas, was ousted in the second round by Melvin "Chick" Harbert of Battle Creek, Mich., on the nineteenth, while U. S. Open Titleholder Lawson Little lost out in the first round to Leland Gibson, Kansas City.

Two former world titlists will renew an old ring feud Tuesday night at the armory when they tangle for the coast junior heavyweight title.

When Jesse James, Greek scientist, clashes with Dan McShain of Hollywood, it'll be the second time these two ring mavericks climbed into the ring to battle for a junior heavyweight belt. The first time the bout settled the world title, and James won.

Dangerous Dan, the patriarch of all menies, lost the world crown to James in a battle at the Hollywood mental emporium. James, subsequently, lost the title to Red Berry. But when he wrestled it from Dan in that memorable Hollywood brawl he set the wheels turning in a healthy misunderstanding between the two.

In Tuesday's main event the two grapplers—exact opposites in every respect—will tussle with a \$500 cash award and the coast belt at stake.

New ways of playing the game were soon developed. Chief forms now are three-cushion, balkline and pocket. On Sept. 7, 1865, Louis Fox and John Deery met for championship in Rochester. Far in the lead, Fox found himself bothered by a fly. He tried to chase fly, which kept lighting on cue ball. He mis-cued, and it was Deery's shot. Deery ran out the string. Heartbroken, Fox rushed out, leaped into a river and was drowned.

WILLIE HOPPE, often called the boy wonder, earned a living for his family at age of 9 by playing exhibition matches. At 18 he won his first world's championship at Paris in 1906. While other sports leaders of that time have retired, Hoppe is still tops in billiards.

JAKE SCHAEFER, SR., became champion and was hailed as a wizard. An 8-inch balkline was written into the rules in an effort to stop the peerless performer, but Schaefer continued to win. In 1885, it was increased to 14 inches, and when this didn't halt Schaefer, to 18 inches. He remained as brilliant at balkline as at the earlier game.

The Washington Huskies, now and the second place Oregon State Beavers meet in a two-game series in Seattle Friday and Saturday.

The Huskies, who lost to the Montana quintet Friday night in a non-conference game, recovered their marksmanship to defeat the Montanans 39-31.

STANFORD, Jan. 20 (UP)—The University of Washington Huskies Saturday took the second game of their series with the University of Montana hoop squad, 39-31. The Huskies lost Friday night.

Two brilliant flashes of scoring, one at the start of each period, gave Washington substantial leads that the Grizzlies, doggedly pounding the hoop, were never able to overcome. The Huskies led at halftime, 21 to 18.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Jan. 20 (UP)—Stanford's basketball team got a fast start in its drive for a Pacific Coast conference southern division basketball title Saturday by defeating University of Southern California for the second consecutive night, 39-34.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 20 (AP)—Billy Conn, a big blond boy who's determined to get much bigger, started a two-month "second helpings" campaign here today.

Conn said he would attempt to eat his way to the heavyweight boxing crown while staying at the Normandy Isle home of Promoter Mike Jacobs. The Pittsburgh boxer and Jacobs arrived Sunday and Conn immediately started getting in a little preliminary work at the dinner table.

Conn explained that he hoped to push his ring weight up to the 187-pound mark and then take on Louis late next summer. He weighs 183 now but admits that his ring weight probably would be about 178. That means he must gain at least 10 pounds if he is to reach his goal.

ASHLAND, Jan. 20 (AP)—Jack Butterworth paced Rubenstein's Oregonians of Eugene to a 48 to 41 win over the Southern Oregon College of Education basketball team Saturday night.

In a preliminary game the Klamath Falls high frosh team defeated Ashland junior high, 28 to 26.

Cougar Center Paces Coast Hoop Scoring

EUGENE, Jan. 20 (AP)—Paul "Bunyan" Lindeman, giant Washington State college center, continued to lead the northern division, Pacific Coast conference individual basketball scoring race today, following the Cougars' victory over Idaho Saturday night. The 225-pound hooper added only two points to his total against the Vandals, but enough to keep the pace with 43 — scored in five games. He is followed by a teammate, Ray Sundquist, with 40. Ray Turner of Idaho with 33 and two Oregon Webfoots, Hank Anderson with 32 and Vic Townsend with 31.

Norm Daltrop of Washington, idle in league play last week, remained on top in averages with 13 points per game, and was followed by Turner with 11. Anderson with 10.7, Townsend with 10.3, and Otis Hilton, Lanky Idaho center, with 9.7.

Lindeman has the most field goals with 18 and Townsend the most free throws with 13. Dale Gentry of Washington State is the "bad man" of the division with 18 personal fouls, and average of 3.2 per game. He is trailed by Bill Morris of Washington and Don Durdan.
