

MEAT DEALERS TO HOLD RALLY MEETING HERE

Local meat men will gather Thursday night in the Elk hotel at 8 o'clock for a huge rally to formulate plans for continued cooperation with the national advertising and merchandising campaign being sponsored by the American Meat Institute.

The campaign, which has just completed its fourth month, is a long-range promotion designed to restore meat to its proper place in the diet by acquainting the public with its health value, thrift, and variety of uses.

Plans for the first months of 1941 will be explained in detail by means of a slide-sound film, and a motion picture, "Meat and Romance," which is supplied by the national live stock and meat board, will give ideas on effective meat merchandising.

"Sixteen national magazines and more than 270 leading newspapers will continue to present many unusual facts concerning the place of meat in the diet," said L. E. Mead, chairman of the committee handling arrangements for the meeting. "Eminent medical authorities recognize that the proteins, minerals and vitamins supplied in liberal quantities by meat make it one of our most nutritious and wholesome foods, and industry advertising is performing a real public service by making the facts available to consumers."

"Furthermore, by acquainting housewives with the thriftier, but equally nutritious cuts, we are showing them how they can put meat on their tables more often and still keep within their budgets."

"We in Klamath Falls intend to do our part in making the national campaign a success. Plans for the first months of the coming year will be discussed in detail at the meeting Thursday evening. Everyone in the meat industry from producer to retailer is invited to attend."

The local meeting is one of several hundred being held all over the country to introduce this second phase of the national promotion. Among those who will participate in the program is John Houston, mayor of Klamath Falls, who will speak. Assisting Chairman L. E. Mead in arranging the meeting are C. A. Pauley, Pauley Packing company, and Frank Lowell, Klamath Packing company.

Storm-Battered Sloop Returns To S. F. Bay

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22 (UP)—Battered by wind and waves outside the Golden Gate, the 40-foot Seattle sloop Sindri with six persons aboard was brought back to a safe anchorage Tuesday, badly damaged and its passengers suffering from shock and inhalation of motor fumes. The Sindri was skippered by George Hall, former Seattle newspaperman. With him were his wife, Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Davenport of San Francisco; Miss June Sprau of Chicago, and J. D. Mower of Montana. They sailed from San Francisco Monday night.

Off the Farallones a wind squall struck the boat, snapping the main boom and ripping apart the jib sail. The motor died, and the crew hoisted the only remaining sail in an attempt to reach Point Reyes.

After hours of drifting the men succeeded in getting the motor started again and in bringing the boat back through the Golden Gate to Yacht harbor. Mrs. Davenport and Mrs. Hall, overcome by fumes from the motor which seeped into the cabin, were revived and taken to a hospital for observation.

Alfred B. Kelley, state commander of the American Legion, spoke to juniors and seniors Tuesday, urging boys and girls alike to make necessary sacrifices in order that they might meet the world challenge which, he said, definitely will come.

"Are we isolated?" Kelley asked. "How can we be when we put down a rebellion in Asia, put down the Boxer rebellion in China, and have settled a foreign policy and taken away one nation's possessions?"

"America is an idealistic nation—big, powerful, rich in the family of nations. We mustn't lose or callous these ideals; unless we are careless we won't."

It is the German people with their "Germany, Germany, over all" attitude who have challenged democracy, not Mr. Hitler, Kelley pointed out. "When ideals of democracy are challenged we can not be isolated," he said.

"I believe in the American people; I believe in American ideals. We must all get in, serve and serve alike, for it is proper that all should bear the responsibility which is building patriotism, making men realize they have a part in the country." Kelley was in favor of universal service to the country, concluding, "To have a fine, strong nation we must all work together."

Angus Newton, district commander of the Legion, introduced Captain Meiring and the speaker. Elsie Kurnick was chairman of the assembly; Principal L. B. Emery presided.

'Cactus Jack' Garner Ends 43-Year Career of Public Service, Hits Texas Trail

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (UP)

John Nance Garner, ending 43 years of public life, swung aboard a Texas-bound train Monday night barely eight hours after he had relinquished the vice presidency of the United States.

With the inevitable cigar in one hand, private citizen Garner waved goodbye to a small group of personal friends and headed for his beloved Uvalde.

"God bless you," he murmured as the friends left his train compartment.

Dr. George W. Calver, senate physician, was the only capitol official at the station. Bascom Timmons, Texas newspaperman and confidante of the former vice president, led the group of friends who said goodbye.

Earlier, Garner had exchanged farewells with his senate colleagues in his chambers at the senate office building.

At precisely noon today, Garner reached the end of a trail that had carried him from the Texas legislature to the second highest office in the land. It was then that he relinquished his vice presidential robes and administered the oath to his successor—Henry A. Wallace.

Grizzled "Cactus Jack" fought hard to conceal the sadness of his parting with public life, but a vagrant tear trickling down his ruddy cheek betrayed his emotions as he packed his bags and prepared to return to his beloved Texas. He was compelled to admit, with a hitch in his voice, that "It's sad to leave old friends."

That was a day that Garner will long remember. Not merely because it brought to a close his public career. There were little sentimentalities that he probably will cherish more than the many honors bestowed upon him during the long span of public life.

There was, for instance, the gratitude of his senate colleagues who expressed their appreciation of his "courtesy, fairness, impartiality and ability" in a resolution adopted just before his term expired.

There were the words of Senate Republican Leader Warren Austin who expressed the appreciation of minority members this way:

"This is not a farewell. I desire to recognize his candor and encourage his future service to his fellow men."

Garner was not present to hear these praises.

Then there was the warm handshake from President Roosevelt just before the "boss" left the inaugural platform. Forgotten for the moment now was the recent past during which Garner sacrificed his political career in an attempt to prevent the third-term inauguration he witnessed today.

When the president shook his hand, he leaned over and whispered something in Mr. Roosevelt's ear. Both laughed heartily.

After the inaugural ceremony, Garner returned to his office, changed into a business suit and ordered spare ribs and sauerkraut.

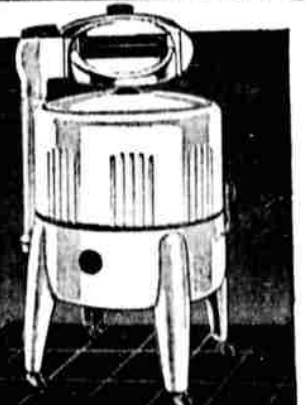
