## Continued Service

MARTIN SWANSON received the distinguished service award of the Klamath County Junior Chamber of Commerce because he believes that an individual who wins a living from a community should return to that community all that he can in public service.

Such is his philosophy and such is his record. He has served actively in the junior chamber of commerce for years, has given his leadership to such diverse activities as the Salvation Army and the Community Concert association, has most recently devoted earnest effort to his position as a member of the Klamath county public welfare commission. These are all classified as non-remunerative services, but Mr. Swanston receives his remuneration in satisfaction for work well done and in his firm belief that Klamath county is a good place to earn a living and raise a family.

It is interesting and significant that the men who have received the junior chamber award have continued to live in Klamath county and to give generously in public service. Percy Murray, the 1935 winner, is chairman of the Klamath union high school board and active in many other ways. Harlan Bosworth, 1936, is this year president of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce. L. Orth Sismore, 1937, is district attorney and among other things chairman this year of the Elks national defense committee. Charles H. Mack, 1938, is county assessor and among other things president of the state assessors' association. Clifford Jenkins, 1939, is county club agent and is carrying on the extensive Four-H and junior livestock show work which won him the award.

It is plain from this report that the junior chamber honor has been well placed and that competent and devoted civic leadership is being constantly developed among the young men of the community. That holds bright promise for the future of Klamath county.

# NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22—It is now popular to forecast another world economic collapse after the war. Mr. Roosevelt's arrangers are even now starting to bank some of the curves for the descent. He has already laid down the program preparing to shift government expenditures into public works and rivers and harbors projects as soon as the defense necessity is passed. But not even the most optimistic expects this program can do anything more than slightly cushion the drop. In all its palmyest spending years the new deal public works projects (before all these schools, postoffices and courthouses were built) involved only a fraction of the \$28,000,000,000 which Mr. Roosevelt is now putting into a three-year rearmament program.

The conclusion is therefore inescapable that further federal manhandling of economics by powerful controls over money, prices, relief, spending and credits is likely to come for the post-war descent as well as the defense boom at hand.

### NOT REGULAR

The post-war decline is not likely to follow the traditional form of collapse (chaotic disintegration) that the people have come to expect. Things are just not permitted to fall apart in strong-arm governments these days. The republicans attempted during the last campaign to dramatize the prospects to be expected from the mounting federal debt, by using the example of insurance policies. In the enthusiasm of political debate, the realities of the situation were obscured by both sides. There is, of course, little chance that your insurance companies can not pay off exactly the number of dollars they have contracted with you for many years to come. Modernized government with all its new powers can stave off such disastrous consequences indefinitely—and will.

But the question (which the democrats did not answer) is how much those dollars are going to be worth. The real value of the dollars you get from insurance, labor, or otherwise, is how much they will buy as against their value today or when the policy was contracted. That is where government steps in. By arbitrary fiat in fixing prices and the value of currency, for example even such a bankrupt government as Hitler's before the war was able to peg all economic life within limits.

### MORE CONTROL

Consequently the worst you are likely to get out of the post war descent is not a traditional collapse, but more centralized controls in the federal government—more money fixing, more price fixing. Violent fluctuations of value will simply be prevented as far as is possible by the new powers that have been discovered in recent years and more that will have to be invented. The beginnings of these powers are already on the statute books. How they will be expanded and carried forward no one today will say.

The government will merely move to meet situations as they develop both in the impending armament boom and its effects, as best it can, in order to avoid consequences.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 22 (UP)—The third requisition of Oregon men to be drafted into the army as part of Oregon quota of 2806 men, was received at selective service headquarters here today.

The call was for 980 men, who will be inducted into service at Portland beginning February 17 and ending March 8. Most of them will go into service at the rate of 69, 75 and 100 men a day on specified days.
