KLAMATH GUARDS TO GET NEW QUARTERS

Klamath national guardsmen stationed at Camp Clatsop will soon be moved from their present tent living quarters to newly built barracks at Fort Stevens, it was made known in a letter received in Klamath Falls Wednesday. The move is expected to take place about February 3.

According to information sent home by Sergeant Forrest H. Alter, Battery A, 249th C. A., the Klamath men have been kept actively engaged in training since their return to camp from Christmas furlough.

Their first night back at camp they were sent on a four-mile trip with full packs, returning in a jovial mood which indicated all were in good shape following their 11-day vacation.

On January 8 the Second Battalion, a harbor defense unit consisting of Batteries A and C of Klamath Falls and Battery B of Ashland, was sent by train to Fort Stevens, where the battalion was divided for armament training. Battery A is trained in the use of 12-inch mortars, Battery B in six-inch disappearing rifle, and Battery C in 10-inch disappearing rifle. The battalion returns to Clatsop in time to stand retreat at 4:45.

Night hikes are held about once a week.

Corporal Dale M. Hayden, Battery A, has recently been appointed sergeant.
