

DEATH CLAIMS CLYDE BRADLEY HERE TUESDAY

The ranks of Klamath county pioneers was thinned Tuesday with the death of Clyde Bradley, 79, for the past 52 years a resident of this section. Mr. Bradley came to Oregon at the age of 27 and settled in the Bonanza country in 1888, later purchasing a farm near Merrill. The majority of Mr. Bradley's time in Klamath was spent in operating ranches and several years ago he retired after successful endeavors in his work.

Mr. Bradley was born in Hardin county, Kentucky, February 12, 1861. Funeral services are under the direction of Ward's Klamath Funeral home.

Mr. Bradley became a member of Klamath lodge No. 137, IOOF on July 21, 1900, becoming a past grand of the lodge, December 31, 1933. He joined Prosperity Rebekah lodge, No. 104, March 7, 1901; became a member of Ewauna Encampment No. 46, IOOF, December 9, 1903, and attained the rank of past chief patriarch on July 1, 1932. He was also a member of Canton Crater No. 7, Patriarchs Militant, IOOF. For eight years he served as trustee of Klamath lodge, devoting a considerable portion of his time during his retirement to the business affairs of the lodge, giving the organization the benefit of his business judgment and experience.

Of Mr. Bradley his friends paid this tribute: "He was one of those generous, friendly pioneers of Klamath county, and leaves many friends, business associates, and brother lodge members to mourn his passing."

ELIXIR FAILS TO PRODUCE EFFECT AS ADVERTISED

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22 (UP)—Myrtle E. Edwards, producer of an elixir known as the "Elga Bust Developer," pleaded guilty in federal court Tuesday to a charge of violation of the federal pure food and drug acts.

Government attorneys charged the product fell far short of its proclaimed powers to add desired contours to slender figured users.

At that moment Mrs. Nellie Kuder of Oakland ran to the judge's bench and cried out her protest:

"It seems a shame to me," she said, "that the government should try to stop this woman from selling such a fine medicine. Why, I've already taken a dozen bottles. It invigorates me. It makes me peppy."

CREAM MEN CALL ON 8000 FARMERS IN TEST CIRCUIT

Nearly 8000 farm calls were made by cream graders working in the state department of agriculture's phase of the Oregon dairy products quality improvement program in 1940, reports A. W. Metzger, foods and dairies division chief.

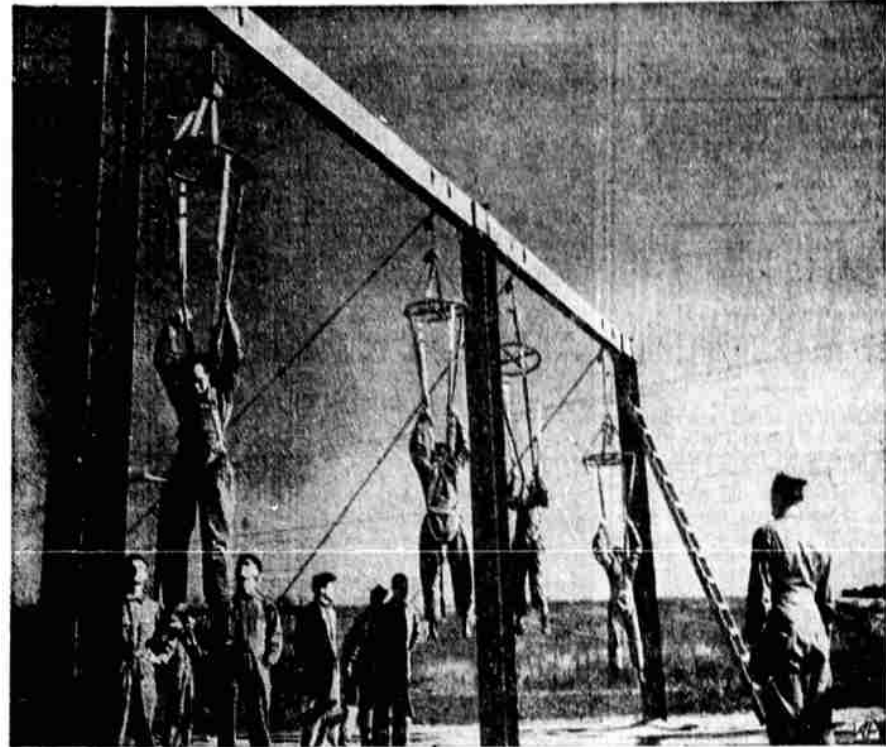
The summary of the year's work shows that 80,892 sediment tests were run; 59,435 cans of cream graded; 2178 pieces of equipment were condemned for repair; 4917 cans of milk and 788 cans of cream condemned; and 2589 creamery calls made.

Farm calls were made to those producers whose cream did not meet the highest grade in order to help them obtain a higher price for the raw product. In some localities second grade cream brought as much as 5 cents per pound buttermilk less than premium cream. In other words, premium cream is worth approximately \$1.50 more for each 10-gallon can of cream testing about 40 per cent buttermilk. Main causes for grading down cream are matters which the producer generally can remedy without any material financial outlay. Two of these causes are failure to see that separator is properly cleaned and failure to cool cream immediately after milking. Also, in many cases warm cream is separated into a can containing cream which has already been cooled.
