

21 APPLY FOR CITIZENSHIP EXAMS HERE

Twenty-one applicants for naturalization papers visited the county clerk's office Monday and Tuesday in one of the heaviest rushes on record for the office. A final hearing on applications has been tentatively set for April 22 and officials expect one of the largest groups in recent Klamath county history to take the final oath.

Three reasons were advanced by the clerk's office for the big demand for papers. The recently-enacted alien registration law, citizenship requirements for various work relief projects and the national defense program were cited.

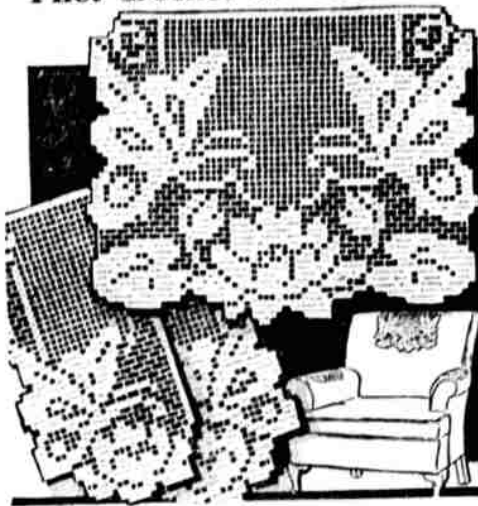

Savory Dishes Suggested By Herb Cookery Ideas

ONION and minestrone soup are two international favorites. There are many variations of these popular themes. However, Irene Botsford Hoffman's new "Herb Cookery" is so successful in pointing ways to better eating, we might use her soup recipes for these two specialties.

MINESTRONE ALLA NAPOLITANA (serves 6)

One cabbage, 2 carrots, sliced; 2 onions, sliced; 2 leeks, sliced; 1 stalk celery, sliced; 2 turnips, sliced; 1 pound salt pork, 13 quarts stock; 1 cup rice for macaroni, salt, pepper, French roll.

Mince the salt pork and try out in saucepan; and onions and vegetables and shredded cabbage which has been soaked in salted water for half an hour. Fry all together, moisten with hot bouillon, and stew gently until all the vegetables are done. Boil rice or macaroni cut into short pieces; add to the contents of the saucepan and continue to simmer until done. Season with salt and pepper.

Put slices of toasted French roll in bottom of a tureen and pour the minestrone over them. Serve very hot. It should be thick enough to be eaten with a fork as well as a spoon.

ONION SOUP I (serves 6)

Four large onions (or 1 to each serving), 1 quart stock (add 1 cup for each extra portion), 4 tablespoons butter (add 1 tablespoon for each extra portion), salt, black pepper, freshly ground, thick slices or crusts of French, Italian or Vienna bread, parmesan cheese.

Slice the onions in rings and fry in butter until light brown, stirring constantly. Add stock and simmer for 15 to 25 minutes. If liquid has materially reduced, add enough boiling water for the required amount. Salt and pepper to taste. Have ready slices

of well-toasted bread, place them in soup plates and cover with onion, spooned out in equal portions; sprinkle a little grated cheese over each one, then pour in the soup and serve with more grated cheese passed at the table.

ONION SOUP II (serves 4)

Four large onions (or 1 to each portion), 1 quart thin stock, any kind; 4 tablespoons butter, 1 cup thin cream or rich milk, 2 egg yolks, salt, black pepper, 2 tablespoons grated parmesan cheese.

Slice and fry onions in butter until yellow, stirring constantly. Drain off butter and add stock (any kind); simmer about 20 minutes. Season with salt and freshly ground pepper and remove to hot casserole in which it is to be served. Mix egg yolks with cream and stir in hot soup. Add parmesan cheese, stirring well.

Place 1 or 2 pieces well-toasted French bread in each soup plate; put a spoonful of onions on each piece and then a ladleful of soup. Pass more grated parmesan cheese.

LUNCHEON: Tomato juice, baked beans, brown bread, tangerines, tea, milk.

DINNER: Onion soup No. 2, mixed green salad, compote of fruit, lemon sponge cake, coffee, milk.
