The eleventh annual conference for the study of home interests will be held at Oregon State college February 25 to 28, according to Winifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent.

The conference will open with a reception and banquet Tuesday evening, February 25, in the Memorial Union hall with Governor Sprague as speaker. A chorus concert accompanied by the college orchestra will follow. Noted speakers are on the conference program, including E. Stanley Jones, Dr. John T. Reiser, executive secretary of Rural Missions; Miss Rowntree, head of the University of Washington foods and nutrition department; Dr. Todhunter, head of the Washington State college home economics research department. General assembly speakers include Dr. Magruder, who will discuss the international situation, Dr. Branton of University of Oregon and State Librarian Harriet Long. Mrs. Buena M. Maris, extension specialist, will conduct a panel discussion and Dr. Erickson of the state public health department will discuss diet deficiencies. Recreation features are also on the program.

Ryan Air Plant Strike Averted By New Contract

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 22 (AP)—A strike which threatened to tie up the Ryan Aeronautical company plant, busy on government aircraft orders, was averted early today as company and CIO representatives agreed on a new contract.

Harry C. Malcom, the federal conciliator, announced the settlement and said no statement of the contract's terms would be released until a meeting of the United Automobile Workers' local tonight to ratify it.

Simultaneously, Richard T. Frankenstein, CIO negotiator, announced plans for an immediate drive to organize the far larger consolidated plant here, which has a backlog approximating \$350,000,000 in government and foreign orders and employs more than 15,000 workers.

LANGELL VALLEY HEARS SOIL HEADS

Robert Warren, chairman, and William L. Teutsch, secretary of the Oregon Soil Conservation committee, held a hearing in Langell valley Tuesday, January 21, to explain to land owners their steps in organizing a soil conservation district and to listen to favorable and unfavorable sentiment of land owners. The meeting was well attended by representative land owners and sentiment was unanimous for proceeding with district organization. The necessary steps will be a referendum at which at least 51 per cent of the land owners and 70 per cent of all land in the district must vote in favor of the district in order to be organized. This meeting should be held about the middle of March, according to C. A. Henderson, county agent.

Work completed at the hearing was outlining district boundaries and selecting a committee to conduct the referendum. This committee consists of M. T. Prince, chairman; O. S. Campbell, Lloyd Gift, M. D. Settle and K. C. Wilkerson. The Langell Valley Irrigation District office was selected as the place for holding the referendum.

Funeral Services Held in Medford for Daughter of Early Settler of Klamath

Word of the death of Martha Ellen Van Horn Howard, 78, reached old friends in Klamath Falls this week. Mrs. Howard died in Medford Friday and was buried in the valley Tuesday. She had made her home in southern Oregon for the past 66 years, having spent her girlhood in Klamath county where she came at the age of 12.

Mrs. Howard was the daughter of John Van Horn, one of the earliest settlers of this section. He operated a stage coach stop which old timers will remember was called the Jenny Creek station and located not far from Jenny creek and just over the hill on the old stage road near where Pinehurst now stands.

Martha Ellen Van Horn was married to Irvin Brown, son of O. T. Brown who came to this county in the '70s, and operated the first sawmill in the county, located on Spencer creek and later sold to H. E. Spencer, grandfather of Mrs. George Hurn of this city. Mr. Brown died nine years after his marriage of pneumonia contracted in the winter of 1890, known to pioneers as the worst winter ever to hit this country. The Browns were living in the Rogue River valley and young Irvin Brown rode a horse to his father's home through the deep snow for a visit. He came down with a severe cold and died a short time later.

Mrs. Brown was left a widow with a number of children. She later married Mr. Howard and spent the remainder of her life in the valley. She is survived by four sons, Roy Brown, Shady Cove; Ozro Brown, Klamath Falls; Irvin Brown, Modesto, Calif.; Nathan Howard, Los Angeles, and two daughters, Mrs. Mae Taylor and Mrs. Eula Taylor, both of Los Angeles. Mrs. Howard was the grandmother of Basil Brown of Klamath Falls.

The old Irvin Brown place is now known as the Ess ranch and faces the Keno highway.

TOWNSEND CLUB URGES PENSIONS

A message urging legislation in support of an adequate old age pension was addressed to President Roosevelt and Oregon's senators and congressmen Tuesday night at a meeting of Townsend club No. 1.

The club's newly elected officers, who were installed at the previous meeting, presided. They are: George J. Kunzman, president; Carl Hammond, vice president; Phoebe Hammond, secretary; Ruth Matthews, treasurer.

By unanimous vote, the following message was sent to the president, Senators Charles L. McNary and Rufus C. Holman, and Congressmen Walter M. Pierce, Homer D. Angell and James W. Mott:

"We, the members of Townsend club No. 1 of Klamath Falls, Oregon, by unanimous vote respectfully petition each of you to promote legislation in support of the Townsend plan of an adequate old age pension which is most practical and workable, retiring those beyond the age of 60 years on pension and thereby providing jobs for millions of unemployed youths and young married folks throughout the nation and which will have a most far-reaching effect in the solution of our unemployment and economic problem for the present and future. We are sending this petition at the request of the club and will thank you for your loyal support to an adequate old age pension for the U. S. A., which we anticipate at this session of congress as a defense measure."
