HOSPITALITY FOR TROOPS LOCAL PLAN

A committee was formed and preparations made Thursday to advance community hospitality and practical assistance to various army units moving through Klamath Falls.

On the initiative of President Harlan Bosworth of the chamber of commerce a cooperative program was worked out. Heading the committee is Fred Heilbroner, as representative of the chamber of commerce, and other members are: Harry Wilson, county court; Ed Bell, city of Klamath Falls; Frank Howard, home guard; and Angus Newton, American Legion. Major Ted Case of the selective draft staff will serve as vice-chairman.

The committee will undertake an inventory of resources which could be utilized for quarters for the troops. Availability of various utilities, facilities for feeding, parking space, and similar information will be gathered.

President Bosworth of the chamber said it is hoped to extend the community's hospitality to the visiting troops as a contribution toward the national defense effort.

He pointed out there have been several troop movements through here and a number of others are scheduled. "The use of our highways for these movements seems highly significant to me," said Bosworth. "It indicates a recognition of their suitability for such military purposes."

SNOW STORAGE HEAVIER THIS YEAR, REPORT

Snow stored in the mountains promises an even greater water supply for the Klamath country and southern Oregon as a whole as reports from Annie Springs station in Crater Lake national park shows a better than average snow depth. There is more than 100 inches at that point as compared to 60.3 inches last year, 109.3 in 1939, and 66.7 inches in 1938.

At Crater lake rim six and one-half feet of snow outlines the lake and at government headquarters 118 inches was the depth reported Thursday morning. Little snow fell Thursday night, however the early morning snow was expected to up this figure considerably.

The snow is dry and powdery, according to the radio report received Thursday morning from Don C. Fisher at the park office. Maximum temperature Wednesday was 30 degrees, the minimum 25. A southwest moderate wind was blowing, it was cloudy and visibility poor. Chains are advised from headquarters to the rim, and all people driving into the park are asked to exercise a great deal of caution as the road bed is covered with ice and snow.

The entire state was overcast Thursday with a forecast of snow and rain. Roads are in fair shape with four inches of new snow at Sand creek on Sun mountain bringing the total of 82 inches. Snowplows are on duty 24 hours a day. The Willamette highway is bare with snow in patches, according to the highway report.

No precipitation was reported Thursday morning, but snow started falling in small blizzard proportions about 9 o'clock, melting as it struck streets and sidewalks and resulting in a fine combination of mush and slush.
