manian capital in collaboration with German armed forces, ordered swift trials for the rebels and called on citizens to report nests of snipers.

Quick Trials

Military courts were under orders to try those rounded up within 24 hours of arrest, with punishment to be executed within 10 hours of sentencing.

All permits for firearms were cancelled, even those for hunting weapons. All civilian-held guns must be turned in by night-fall today.

German and Rumanian motorized troops patrolled Bucharest streets while chief of state General Ion Antonescu wrestled with the problem of restoring order to his country after bitter internal strife.

Early this morning Antonescu announced that the Iron Guard would be reorganized under his own leadership.

College President Says U. S. Would Lose By Fighting

CHICAGO, Jan. 24 (AP)—President Robert M. Hutchins of the University of Chicago declared last night that the cause of democracy would best be served if the United States stayed out of war.

The nation, he said, has just begun to grasp the meaning of justice, democracy, the moral order, and the supremacy of human rights. To go to war, he averred, would be to cancel whatever progress has been made toward achievement of democratic ideals.

The 42-year-old educator and World War veteran asserted in an unsponsored address over the National Broadcasting company's red network that the American people, "deafened by martial music, fine language, and large appropriations," were drifting into war.

The nation must secure for itself a realization of democratic ideals, he contended, before it can serve as a missionary abroad. A statement urging immediate enactment of the lease-lend bill and signed by 125 University of Chicago faculty members was issued while Dr. Hutchins spoke.

There are approximately 900 on the faculty. The statement set forth that Americans who say the war is of no concern to the nation "practice a policy of appeasement."

Sailors Given Sentences For Swastika Episode

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24 (UP)—Municipal Judge Peter Mullins yesterday gave a 90-day suspended sentence to two U. S. navy seamen who tore down the nazi swastika flag from the German consulate here last Saturday, and turned them over to naval authorities for further discipline.

Harold Sturtevant, 19, and E. G. Lackey, 20, were found guilty of malicious mischief. Judge Mullins said he had been assured by the navy that they would be "dealt with adequately."

NEW WATER LINE BEING INSTALLED ON SUMMERS LANE

Copco crews are a quarter of the way finished on the installation of 5000 feet of new water main along Summers lane, it was announced Friday at the local offices. Two-inch pipe is being replaced by six-inch cast-iron pipeline.

The 15 men on the crew are expected to finish the task within 30 days. The new line, which will better serve a number of new homes that have been built in the last two years, extends down Summers lane a distance of one mile from the highway.

COURT APPROACHED ON FIRE PROBLEM

A group of farmers concerned with grass fire control in summer months called on the county court Friday for discussion of a possible need for legislation in connection with the fire problem.

Represented were E. M. Hammon, Liskey Brothers, Barton Brothers and Sam Delinger. They expressed the opinion the determination of the beginning and end of the fire season is a matter of local consideration, and that the county court should be empowered to make such decisions.

EQUIPMENT FOR DISASTER WORK BEING GATHERED

Equipment for use in disaster relief and national defense is being gathered together by Boy Scouts of this community in cooperation with the Red Cross.

Troops 1 and 4 are getting together tents and cots for the housing project. Troops 6 and 9 are getting together enough equipment to cook meals for 100 persons. Members of troops 5, 18 and 11 are practicing directing traffic, orderly duty and messenger service and are also locating emergency camp sites.

Petaun Appoints National Advisory Council in France

VICHY, France, Jan. 24 (AP)

A new national council of nearly 200 members was created by Chief of State Philippe Petaun today to share with him the responsibility of directing the government.

An announcement by Petaun more than a month ago forecasting formation of the assembly said it would "give advice and assure useful contact between the chief of state and the people."

The new body will be only provisional until a new constitution is created.

The council will have neither constitutional nor legislative powers. It will be consulted only on questions submitted by Petaun and its decisions will be only "advice" to the chief of state, who need not follow it.

Not only parliamentarians, but more than 40 representatives from agriculture, an "appreciable contingent" from industry, prominent intellectuals and members of liberal professions are to be given membership.
