

Combine Meats With Other Items to 'Stretch' It

Meat extenders play a delicious role in the economy menu. By using cheese, dried beans, spaghetti, noodles, breadcrumbs and milk sauces, you can make your meat, fish or poultry allowance go much farther. The extenders for a well-balanced menu must not only make two servings of the main dish where there was only one, but must also increase the nutrition of the main dish. The nutritional, as well as flavor value of the extender, is very important.

Creamed left-over chicken served on hot cornbread is a good example. The cream sauce for the chicken contains butter, flour and milk—all good foods. The cornbread contains a cereal, butter, milk plus an egg. Therefore this dish is a valuable source of first-class nutrients, as well as being a delicious way

of making a small amount of chicken go a long way.

Chicken pie is always big news for the family. It's also big economy news as a well-balanced extender one-dish meal, containing protein of chicken and assorted vegetables.

To boil fowl for chicken pie or other chicken extenders, cook whole. Singe and clean a 5-pound fowl. Place in large pot, half cover with boiling water. Add 2 celery stalks, a small onion, 1 small carrot, 1 bay leaf, 1 sprig parsley, 2 whole cloves, salt and pepper. Cover and simmer over low heat until meat is tender, about 2 1/2 hours. Let fowl cool in pot.
