

SUN MOUNTAIN GETS 9 INCHES OF NEW SNOW

The US weatherman forecast "generally fair" weather for the weekend in the Klamath basin but added residents shouldn't be surprised at either a little snow or a little rain.

A few flakes fell early Friday morning adding to the trace of precipitation in earlier hours. But on Sun Mountain nine inches of new snow brought the total depth to 86 inches and snow plows and the huge Sno-Go were working day and night.

A light snow was reported falling throughout the Cascades Friday, with rain in the valley, according to the Oregon State highway department radio report. Motorists planning to drive north are advised to put on chains at Fort Klamath Junction as a number of accidents have resulted from the slippery pavement.

There is 23 inches of snow on the level at Quartz Mountain on the Lakeview highway and deeper in drifts.

At Crater Lake national park headquarters 1.8 inches of new snow fell bringing the total depth to 123 inches. Maximum temperature was 33 degrees, minimum, 25. The sky was overcast, a light snow falling, and visibility at the lake zero. Skiing prospects were fair as a dry, powdery snow covers the normal pack. All roads into the park are open to two-way traffic, but chains are recommended from headquarters to the rim, the Friday morning radio report stated.

But suppose America does not. That is going to leave "helpless" womanhood in quite a spot.

All over the country husbands of college-trained girls will be saying, when something goes wrong with the family car, "You'd better come out and take a look at this engine, Sue." Or, "How about changing the tire, Mable? You can do it in half the time I can."

OUT GOES THE "HELPLESS" LINE
And the trouble will probably go even further. How can a trained mechanic get her husband to do any of the dirty work around the house, just by pulling the old "helpless" line?

A girl who can take a car apart and put it back together again certainly can hang the living room curtains, pull the ice tray out when it's stuck, open cans, or even fire the furnace.

The girls probably haven't thought of this possibility yet. They're feeling patriotic and are tickled to be tinkering with motors — all the while thinking, "If war comes I'll be a useful citizen, perfectly capable of doing work that has always been considered men's work. I'll free one man to take up arms for his country."

That's a fine thing to be thinking.

But if they aren't needed for national defense, will these same trained mechanics, married to young men who know more about guns than engines, think as they lie under the family car in grease-stained overalls, "Isn't it nice that I can do a man's job, and leave him to the evening paper?"

RESEARCHER OKAYS EUROPE FOOD SUPPLY

ASILOMAR, Calif., Jan. 24 (AP)—Dr. M. K. Bennett, director of the Stanford Food Research Institute, said Thursday European nations had accumulated enough food to prevent widespread famine this winter but an ultimate German victory would have the worst possible effect on American agriculture.

Addressing 200 delegates to a conference of California agricultural conservation committees, Dr. Bennett said he believed predictions of serious famine in Europe this winter were unfounded.

"The principal hope for economic rehabilitation of American farming lies in regaining lost export markets," said Bennett. "This may be effected through elimination of the policy of self-sufficiency among nations when the war is over."

This, he believed, can only be possible if the British win and a genuine economic peace is established.

State Chairman Dave Davidson, Tulare county, presided as the three-day conference opened today. Other speakers today were Dr. Joseph S. Davis of Stanford and Fred Entemille, representing the western division of the agricultural adjustment administration.

Put the salt pork into a heavy kettle or saucepan and cook until light yellow. Add the onion, chopped or sliced, and brown lightly. Add the potatoes and water and boil for 5 minutes. Remove bones from the fish and cut into small pieces. Add to the potatoes and season with salt and pepper. Simmer for 10 to 15 minutes. Add the hot milk and serve.
