Fatal Traffic Accidents Result Of Many Causes, Says Pearce

No one can say exactly how many motor vehicle accidents are due to particular causes because most accidents result from a combination of several.

However, a recent survey of state traffic reports on fatal accidents clearly shows that speed violation and improper driving are the most frequently named of contributing factors in traffic fatalities.

According to D. E. Pearce, district representative of Klamath Falls for the Farmers Automobile Inter-Insurance exchange, speed was the most frequently reported violation, figuring in one of every four fatal traffic accidents.

Improper driving, exclusive of speed, was reported in two out of five traffic deaths. In this bracket, violating of right of way in congested or city traffic and driving on the wrong side of the road took the heaviest toll in lives.

In pedestrian deaths, records show that two of every three pedestrians killed by motor vehicles were violating a traffic law. Although there was evidence of driver negligence, it was

apparent that extreme lack of caution on the part of pedestrians was a major contributing factor.

It may be estimated from reports of state traffic authorities that one of every four fatal accidents involved either a driver or a pedestrian who had been drinking.

Other heavily contributory causes were driver defects, loss of sleep, faulty vehicles and vision obstruction.

Darkness also was reported in three out of five fatal accidents. The staggering enormity of

our traffic toll is shown in a comparison with the results in loss of life of the last World war. During the 19 months of participation by the United States in the last World war, 50,510 American soldiers were killed in action or died of wounds. During the 19 months prior to January 1940, 53,150 American citizens were killed in traffic.
