Mayor Houston will auction off the first 10 pieces of the huge cake which is being donated by Fred Hoagland of Fluhrer's bakery.

According to Samuel P. Miller, 1941 dance chairman, money taken in last year totaled \$1130. Because of the great need of funds to aid infantile paralysis sufferers and for research work in combating the dread disease, the local goal has been set for \$1200 and from all indications this amount will be reached. RED CROSS HEADS MAP OUT DUTIES

Fred E. Fleet, chairman, and Lloyd L. Low, vice-chairman of the Disaster committee of the Klamath County chapter of the American Red Cross called a meeting of all sub-committee chairmen at the County courthouse Friday evening.

The following members were in attendance: Mitchell Tillotson, finance chairman; W. J. Dinsmore, transportation chairman; Fred Peterson, housing chairman; Peter Rozendal, medical aid; Howard J. Boyd, first aid chairman; Dick Reeder, clothing chairman; Charles Seavey, telephone communications; E. P. Livingston, telegraph communications; Mrs. Howard Boyd, and Gladys Ongman, chapter representatives. Angus Newton American Legion Commander, represented the American Legion. Dwight Gilchrist representing the Boy Scouts, and Hans Nordland and Otis Metsker from the emergency squad of the Boy Scout committee.

The purpose of this meeting was to acquaint all members with their duties as chairmen of the various committees and to correlate the work with individual organizations with the American Red Cross disaster set-up. Mrs. Howard Boyd, executive secretary, stated the "Red Cross is chartered by Congress to carry on a system of national and international relief in time of peace."

Dwight Gilchrist, boy scout executive, outlined the program of the Boy Scouts, and stated they were ready to stand shoulder to shoulder with the Red Cross in time of an emergency. Newton, Legion commander stated the "American Legion stands ready to do their part, as the Red Cross sees fit."

Plans were made for each sub-committee to have a member from each of the organizations interested in disaster work on their committee to serve as liaison officer between their organization and the American Red Cross. Plans were also made for each sub-committee chairman to notify each representative in the outlying communities in the county of their plans. Hongkong Observing Century Of British Rule With Rapid Preparations for Jap Action

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (AP)—

Far from the mother country, Britain's rich crown colony of Hongkong is getting ready to defend herself, with the "standing room only" sign out. Her most difficult problem—food supply—already is complicated.

At least a million refugees from the Chinese-Japanese war have crowded into Hongkong which became a part of the British empire exactly 100 years ago this month, to join her normal peacetime population of a million.

Fear of an attack from Japan, ever-present thought in Hongkong since the Japanese began their invasion of China in July, 1937, was heightened last September 27 when Japan formally allied herself with Germany and Italy, enemies of the British empire.

British officials in the colony are not likely to forget soon the clamor in the Japanese press that restoration of Hongkong to "Chinese" hands be a part of the Japanese-sponsored "new order of East Asia."

The British believe any attempt to seize Hongkong and her mass of modern fortifications would be long and costly.

But a prolonged siege could bring starvation to the mountainous island and the densely populated settlements on the nearby south China coast, which together form the 391-square-mile area of the colony. The barren slopes yield no food and Hongkong must depend entirely upon communications by sea and land not only for food but, in rainless seasons, even for water.

Alarmed when Japan started her invasion along the southern coast more than two years ago, Hongkong speeded work on a \$40,000,000 defense system.

More big guns were placed on hilltops overlooking the harbor through which poured a vast trade from interior China. Anti-aircraft emplacements surrounded them, and concrete pillboxes housing machine guns began to dot the slopes above the bay.

Digging of deep tunnels in the rocky hills to serve as air raid shelters was begun. This work still continues. Hundreds of

powerful searchlights are ready to spot air raiders.

As early as 1938, practice blackouts were staged, and heavy penalties were provided for failure to extinguish lights when ordered.

Even residents know little about the giant batteries mounted on the island peak above Hongkong and in the hills behind Kowloon, colony peninsula jutting from the mainland.

Those big guns—said to be 16 and 18-inch cannon of greater range than any ship-mounted weapons—were landed and put in place at night, with guards keeping all civilians at a distance.

Altogether, it is in a definitely martial atmosphere that Hongkong observes this month on the 100th anniversary of her inclusion in the British empire.
