

DOUBLE HIT-RUN CRASH REPORTED

State police were investigating a double hit-and-run case in which two cars collided about 6 o'clock Sunday night in front of the Home Lumber company on South Sixth street, both continuing on their respective journeys without "picking up the pieces."

The pieces, according to state police, included the entire glass from the windshield of one car, and a headlight and fender from another. The two machines, one going out of town, the other toward Klamath Falls, met head-on. A great deal of glass was thrown about on the street but there were no marks of blood. It is not known if there were injuries.

Officers reported more than a dozen minor wrecks Saturday night as the result of slippery pavement. There were no injuries.

SHEEPMAN FACES PROPERTY CHARGE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28 (U.P.) Federal officers brought Tom Boylen Jr., Pendleton sheepman, here Monday to face an indictment charging conversion of mortgaged property.

Boylen was arrested in New Orleans, La., and first brought to Pendleton for hospital treatment before being taken here.

United States Commissioner Kenneth Frazer admitted him to \$15,000 bail. U. S. Attorney Carl Donough said Boylen is charged on two counts of disposing of mortgaged sheep and one of making false representations to a lender.

Camp Fire Guardians met at the Little House Tuesday evening for annual installation of officers. Mrs. Loren Palmerton will be president of the association this year. Mrs. Andrew Shanks, vice president. Mrs. Al Ellis secretary, and Mrs. L. A. French treasurer. Local executive, Mrs. J. A. Kennedy, acted as installing officer, reading the regular installation prescribed by national headquarters. Hostesses for the evening were Mrs. Matt Kohn Jr., and Mrs. L. A. French.

The Academy Camp Fire group which was formerly the Snowdrop Bluebirds has selected Mrs. C. A. Williams as their guardian.

The Camp Fire Birthday project for 1941 is "Treasure Trails." This is said to be an opportunity for all Camp Fire girls to explore trails for material for their treasure book and in doing so, not only earn honors but also develop knowledge of their community, increase appreciation of at least one of the arts.

Also, completing the birthday project for 1941 should be an enjoyable experience for every girl taking part. It is divided into five parts—exploring, appreciation, creating, seeking beauty and sharing. For example, in the first division one part reads "Your town—decide what influences from other countries have most shaped and colored the life and art of your town or section of the country." In "appreciation" the girls are asked to make a scrapbook of five or more poets, painters, sculptors, composers or actors who are truly great, including clippings, their professional life and childhood and a resume of their art.

The second part of "appreciation" includes a personal contact with a profession such as acting, dancing, art, or crafts work or factory. A criticism paper or diary is to be kept concerning the profession observed.

In creating, the girls will have 10 phases to follow: music, drawing, painting, poetry, modeling, carving, photography, dancing, designing and choric speechmaking from poems of a favorite poet. All must be original and done only by the girl herself.

These stately nights and wintry days are good fields for "seeking beauty." An account must be kept by each girl following her effort in this field in homecraft, citizenship, handicraft and nature.

To complete the last part of the project "sharing" each group earning the national birthday honor must share what they have learned and collected with other persons. This may be done by a private or public exhibit of their collections or by taking part in a program and telling of some of the treasure trails they have explored.

Girls have from now until April to earn their birthday award.

LEGISLATORS ASK HIGHER SALARIES

SALEM, Jan. 28 (P) — The legislators, always persistent that they shall receive more money for their services while the voters have been equally emphatic that they shall continue to receive \$3 a day for 40 days, are after a pay increase again.

The senate resolutions committee introduced a proposed constitutional amendment to raise the pay to \$8 a day for 50 days, the measure being the same as that defeated at the election last November.

The measure, assured of legislative approval, will be on the ballot in November, 1942.
