Piluso Will Meet Lyons; Prince Back

Nihalakis Will Wrestle Newcomer; Top Bout Pits Runner-up With Armenian

Jesse James, runner-up in the Pacific coast junior heavyweight tournament, will meet a tournament semi-finalist, Mike Nazarian, tonight at the armory in the headline match.

This bout will top a three-way card which marks the reopening of armory hostilities after the tournament finals, won by Dan McShain.

In the semi-final brawl Ernie Piluso of Klamath Falls tangles with Red Lyons, Missouri ruffian, and in the opener Prince Nihalakis of Arabia will return to Klamath for a match against a newcomer, Gene Blakely.

The main bout brings together a super-scientist in James and an ultra-meanie in the mad Armenian. Both are two of the most colorful competitors of the recent tournament and were two of the best drawing cards. James is a strong favorite to win.

The return of Nihalakis will bring out a large group of followers who remember the Prince as one of the most colorful grapplers ever brought here.

He is a talented musician, an expert high diver, an author and a very capable ring scientist.

Tonight's bout will be his first appearance here in several months, a recent trip to Hawaii having kept him from entering the coast tournament.

The card gets underway at 8:30.

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Bomber Will Face Burman At New York

Joe's 13th Title Defense Rated Milestone in Milt Career Prior to Conn Go

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP)—Joe Louis' 13th defense of the world heavyweight championship Friday night against Red Burman at Madison Square garden will be an ultra-important milestone in the Detroit negro's career.

This 15-round bout should prove beyond question whether Bomber Joe is zooming down the toboggan, in the wake of Henry Armstrong, as Louis' last bout with Al McCoy at Boston indicated, or whether his prowess is undimmed as he approaches 27.

This brawl should indicate what we can expect when Louis steps into the Yankee stadium ring with brilliant Billy Conn in June—If Shufflin' Joe still has the title then.

Burman of Baltimore, disciple of the great Jack Dempsey, is the ideal man to give the champion this significant test because he is one of the best all-round fighters Louis ever met. This red-headed Irishman is no washed-up pushover, like some of the bomber's opponents.

Burman, at 25, is right at his physical peak and sharpened to razor edge by more than two months of preparation. He's strong and tough and the best body puncher in the heavyweight division. Men like Pastor, Nova and Barlund evaded meeting him after matches were made. Moreover, the crouch is anathema to Louis, as was demonstrated in the Godoy and Farr fights. Burman's a natural croucher who has used the Dempsey bob and weave for years.

Chicago May Take Up Grid Sport Again

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (AP)—In intercollegiate football is on its way back to the University of Chicago.

Athletic officials of the institution, which abandoned football in December, 1939, are trying to line up six games for the 1941 season.

Schools mentioned as likely grid opponents include university of Louisville, Wheaton (Ill.) college and Shurtleff college of Alton, Ill.

Chicago had no football team last fall for the first time in 40 years.

If games are arranged for 1941, school officials plan to charge no admission and make no cash guarantees to visiting teams. All students at Chicago—freshmen, undergraduates and graduate students—will be eligible.

Majors Advance 1941 Spring Encampments

Seven Clubs Move Training Programs Ahead Of Last Year's Schedules; Giants to Start

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP)—The scent of the wide open races in baseball's major leagues has aroused seven clubs to the extent of advancing their 1941 spring training programs ahead of last year's schedule.

Cleveland, Boston and Chicago, in the American league, and St. Louis, New York, Boston and Pittsburgh, in the National, have arranged to get to work earlier this season.

In addition, Jimmy Wilson, new manager of the Chicago Cubs, will call his entire squad together at Catalina island February 26, instead of last year's setup by which Gabby Hartnett took one section Feb. 22 and another Feb. 29. Thus most of the Cubs also will have an earlier start.

The New York Giants will set the spring training machinery in motion February 14 at Miami, Fla.; the Brooklyn Dodgers will open the next day at Havana, Cuba; the Cleveland Indians will swing into action Feb. 17 at Fort Myers, Fla.; and all except two clubs will be underway before the end of next month.

The Detroit Tigers, American league champions, will summon their batterymen to Lakeland, Fla., March 2 and the rest of the squad March 9. Last year, the camp opened February 25.

The Philadelphia Phillies, perennial National league tailenders, will start March 1 at Miami Beach.

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Ducks Refuse To Give Up In Hoop Race

EUGENE, Jan. 28 (AP)—Despite four straight defeats in their "suicide invasion" of the inland empire, the University of Oregon basketball Webfoots refuse to be counted out of the northern division, Pacific coast conference race.

The Ducks, who returned here Monday from Moscow, opened an intensive campaign to prepare for their next test—a two game series against the University of Washington Huskies here next Monday and Tuesday.

The Ducks will probably be without the services of Hank Anderson, spearhead of the Oregon attack who suffered a knee injury in the second WSC game and saw no action in the final two games against Idaho. Vic Townsend, who leads the division scorers with 74 points scored in seven games has been shifted to forward by Coach Howard Hobson and will likely remain at that position even with the return of Anderson. Bill Borchers seems to have clinched the center post, with Porky Andrews, another leading scorer, and little Paul "Stonewall" Jackson as his guard running mate.

The Duck hoopers said they would not "give up the ship" until it becomes mathematically impossible for them to win the title.

CORAL GABLES, Fla., Jan. 28 (AP)—Match play began in the 10th annual Miami Biltmore women's golf tournament Tuesday but the locker rooms still buzzed with conversation about the amazing 74 scored by Elizabeth Hicks of Pasadena, Calif., in the qualifying round.

Her score not only pared three strokes off women's par but it broke the six-year-old course record by five shots and gave her the medal by the same margin.

Marian Miley of Lexington, Ky., and Grace Amory of Palm Beach equaled the old record 79 but the pace was so fast they were overshadowed.
