CRATER LAKE'S WEATHER CLEAR; NO NEW SNOW

Bright, clear weather continued Wednesday at Crater Lake national park according to the morning radio report received by Don C. Fisher. Maximum temperature was 46 degrees on Tuesday, minimum, 23, and at 8 a. m. was reported at 23 also. The visibility was excellent at the rim with clear weather enjoyed.

Skiing was said to be as good as at any time during the season with three inches of soft snow over a normal pack. At headquarters the snow had settled to 122 inches, and a northeast gentle wind was blowing.

There has been no new snow for several days, it was learned, and all roads are open to two-way traffic. Chains are not required but should be carried.

AIR CRASHES LAID TO PILOT FAILURE

CHICAGO, Jan. 29 (AP)—Capt. Frederick Ceres, M. D., of the U. S. navy medical corps, said Tuesday in a medical journal article that more than half of the aviation crashes can be attributed to the pilot and his poor physical condition.

"Sometimes accidents are unexpected, but it is suspected that in numerous cases heart failures, perforated peptic ulcers, renal stones, epileptic seizures and other acute conditions may constitute a contributing factor," Ceres wrote in the first issue of "War Medicine," published bi-monthly by the American Medical association.

Ceres said that a study of crash-contributing factors had been conducted by the navy for many years, and that a majority of the service's aviation accidents were the result of the pilot, field or terminal, power plant, structural failure, weather conditions, collision in air, fire, night flight training, faulty design, passenger interference and arresting gear.

Reports from European beligerents, Ceres said, indicated that large numbers of pilots are incapacitated for weeks and sometimes months after flights above 30,000 feet. He said it was a symptom of their condition, and that the cause was akin to the "bends," which deep-sea divers suffer often.

Chinese Report New Offensive

SHANGHAI, Jan. 29 (AP)—Chinese reported today that their troops who recently replaced the disbanded communist fourth army had launched an offensive against the Japanese along the Grand Canal, 20 miles north of the Yangtze river.

The new troops took over operations in the Shanghai-Nanking-Hangchow area after disarming the fourth army Jan. 12. The communist fourth was said to have refused orders and attacked a Chungking spokesman termed an "attempted revolt."
