

RESERVATIONS FOR BENEFIT TEA POUR IN

Reservations are coming in rapidly for the Doernbecher hospital for children benefit to be given Saturday, February 1, at 2 o'clock in the Willard hotel. The benefit is sponsored annually by the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club.

Of interest to those who have long been familiar with the needs of Doernbecher, where many Klamath Falls children have received inestimable aid, is the report ending the fiscal year June 30, 1940.

Eight patients from Klamath Falls received medical attention. Over a period of 13 years, 94 Klamath county patients have been admitted to the hospital. The average stay of a patient in the medical unit is 11 days. In the surgical unit, 15.9 days; orthopedic, 24.8; eye, ear, nose and throat, 3.5; total average of days spent in hospital, 8.5 days. Daily average number of patients, 57; during the whole year individual patients treated were 2765.

Mrs. Phelps, superintendent of Doernbecher hospital, gave the following information to Mrs. R. C. Groesbeck of Klamath Falls, state chairman of Doernbecher:

Children need scrappiness, preferably made out of old bed sheets. The size should be 10 by 12 inches so they are easily handled by bed patients. Specifications for garments can be had upon request. Home made toys are in demand at all times and children from infants to 14 years are going to be made happier by the thoughtfulness of those less unfortunate.

A request for old Christmas cards was issued. If you have a bundle of these personal greeting cards, tie them together and call 3220 and they will be called for and sent to the hospital for entertainment of small children.

FAMILY RELATION EXPERT WILL TALK IN CITY

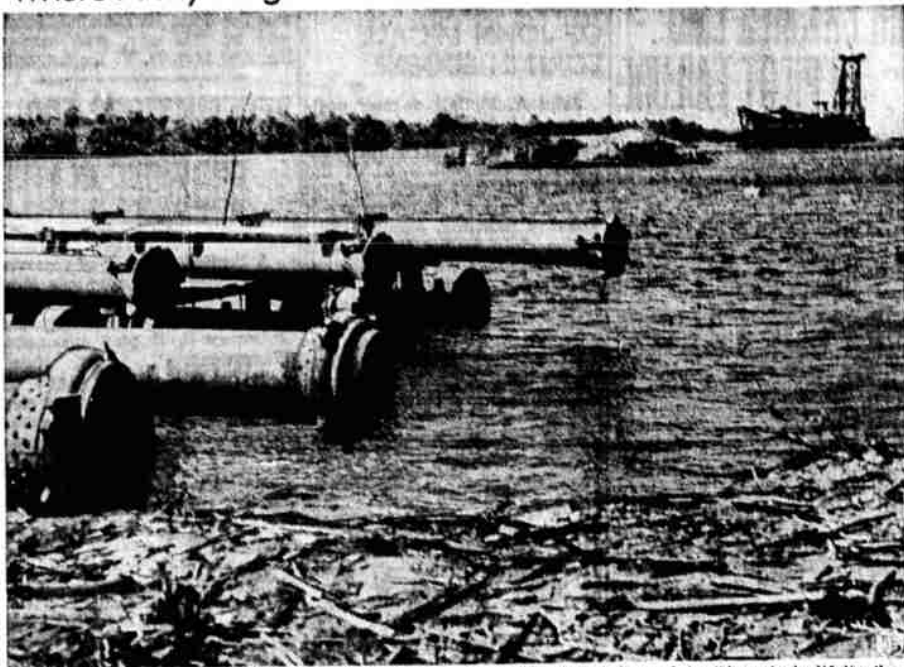

Where Army Forges New Link in America's Lifeline



A new link, considered vital to hemisphere defense, is rapidly being formed in "America's lifeline"—the Panama Canal. DATE SET UP FOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

Dates of the Junior livestock show have been changed, it was announced Tuesday by C. C. Jenkins, 4-H club agent, and many deer hunters are satisfied. Original dates set were from September 20 to 24, inclusive. These are also opening days of the 1941 deer season.

In view of the fact the most ardent supporters of the show are also some of the best buyers, the date was set ahead to September 13 to 16, inclusive.

Additional awards will be included on the 1941 premium list, Jenkins announced. The Hereford association has offered premiums of 25 per cent to exhibitors. That is, if the premium is \$10, the association will add another \$2.50. The Angus association has added \$15 to each of the two Angus classes, light and heavy, and \$10 award if the champion Angus is also the grand champion of the show.

TILLAMOOK BURN LOGGERS TO VOTE ON STRIKE PEACE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29 (AP)—Five hundred striking CIO loggers in the Tillamook burn district will vote tonight at Forest Grove on a proposal their disagreement be arbitrated by Dr. John Steelman and that they return to work immediately.

Steelman is head of the labor department's conciliation service. Union officials approved the proposal yesterday, Robert Freumling, assistant to the director of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO affiliate), said. The strike, which is 15 days old, stemmed from the discharge of two tree fallers for what the union claimed was union activity. The strike affected 10 contracting companies operating for the Consolidated Timber company.

COUNTY RECEIVES SHARE OF STATE LIQUOR REVENUE

Oregon cities and counties received checks totaling \$29,126.87 for their portion of revenue derived from the sale of liquor in the state in the quarterly distribution of funds Tuesday.

Klamath county received \$583.85; Bonanza, \$6.23; Chiloquin, \$19.80; Klamath Falls, \$440.96; Malin, \$14.30; Merrill, \$17.32.

Lake county received \$93.37; Lakeview, \$85.92; Paisley, \$6.33; Silver Lake, \$2.59.

Smallest check in the state went to the city of Lonerock in Gilliam county, for \$1.23, and the city of Barlow in Clackamas county received but \$1.39. Largest check went to the city of Portland for \$8,163.02.

ALMA PENROD NAMED DELEGATE

MONMOUTH, Jan. 29—Alma Penrod, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Penrod of Klamath Falls, Oregon, recently was a delegate to the annual meeting of women student executives in Oregon colleges held at Linfield college.

Miss Penrod is president of the Collecto-Coeds, a women's service club on the OCE campus. She is also active in all other student affairs at the Oregon College of Education.

DEATH ENDS LONG PILOT CAREER OF CAPTAIN RIGGS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29 (AP)—Death ended a half-century career on the Columbia and Snake rivers last night for Captain Arthur Riggs, a Columbia river pilot for 14 years and a river man for 53.

He had been ill for several months. A native of Oregon, Riggs followed in the footsteps of his grandfather on the waterways.

After serving in various capacities on Willamette and Columbia river boats, Riggs became a pilot and master, traversing the Columbia and Snake rivers to Lewiston, Idaho. He piloted the first steamer through the Celilo canal to Lewiston in 1915.

In 1936 he piloted the ocean steamer, Charles L. Wheeler, Jr., through the new Bonneville locks to The Dalles. He spent three "summer vacations" in Alaska piloting on the Yukon river and in St. Michael's harbor. The widow, Sara, survives.

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HOME ECONOMISTS SLATE TWO MEETS

Leaders of 4-H Home Economics projects will be having two training meetings next week conducted by specialists from the Home Economics Extension service in Corvallis.

On Monday, February 3, Lucy Lane, extension specialist in clothing will conduct a training meeting for sewing leaders at the chamber of commerce rooms from 10 to 3 o'clock. Miss Lane is one of the judges of the 4-H clothing at the Oregon state fair and will discuss with the leaders each article included in each of the different clothing projects.

The leaders will bring to the meeting large scraps of cotton material, a zipper, and their sewing equipment to make samples of the sewing processes about which they are in doubt.

On Saturday, February 8, Mabel Mack, acting extension specialist in nutrition, will conduct a training meeting for cooking leaders at the Fremont school home economics room from 10 to 3 o'clock.

The entire day will be devoted to the making of angel food cakes, and a demonstration of the making of sponge cakes. A list of supplies and equipment needed for this training meeting can be obtained from Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent, who is making arrangements for these training meetings.

Mrs. Mack has trained many 4-H leaders in the making of sponge and angel food cakes. These meetings should be particularly valuable in assisting leaders in proving the quantity of the 4-H Home Economics work. All leaders are welcome to attend either or both meetings since they may be leading other clubs in the future.

SUGAR BEETS TO TAKE SLASH IN ACREAGE LIMIT

Definite information that American sugar beet acreage this year will be cut substantially compared with the last two years has just been received from AAA headquarters in Washington, D. C. The national beet acreage allotment in 1939 was 1,030,000 acres. In 1940 all restrictions were removed and the acreage produced became the grower's allotment.

With increased supplies of sugar in storage a reduction in acreage was deemed necessary for 1941 to hold total supplies within bounds, according to AAA officials. The national allotment just announced is for 820,000 acres. Substantially the same formula used in 1939 to divide this national allotment among the various beet-growing districts and individual producers will be used again.

The government exercises no absolute control over sugar beet acreage, any grower being free to produce as much as he wishes. Under the sugar act of 1937, however, benefit payments are made only to those growers who stay within their individual allotments.

Clothing leaders of the Home Extension units will have a training meeting on Tuesday, February 4, at the chamber of commerce rooms from 10 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. Lucy Lane, extension specialist in clothing, Oregon State college, will conduct the training meeting on "Care of the Hair."

This is one of the regular unit meetings which was included in the program last May by representatives of each of the communities in the county. These leaders will return to their communities and demonstrate this subject to each of the units during February and March, according to Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent.

CENTRALIA SLAYER NEARS GALLOWS

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 29 (AP)—Arley O. Lewis of Centralia will go to the gallows early tomorrow morning for the slaying of Jack Avent, 21, of Portland in Vancouver, Wash. last fall, unless there is a last minute stay. Warden P. E. Mahoney said today.

He said a notice of appeal before the supreme court, reported not perfected, will not delay the execution. The hanging was originally scheduled for December 31 but Lewis was granted an additional 30 days to prepare an appeal.
