

EX-KAISER HAS QUIET BIRTHDAY

DOORN, Holland, Jan. 29 (UP)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm was revealed Monday on his 82nd birthday to be following closely the growing sentiment in the United States to support Britain in her war against Germany.

Details were not divulged, but regardless of Wilhelm's political views there was not the slightest doubt he hoped Germany would emerge victorious.

He passed the birthday quietly in the Dutch retreat to which he fled as the World war was ending in 1918. It was little more than another day in the life of an old man marking on his maps with beflagged pins the ebb and flow of another struggle waged by another Germany.

Dressed in civilian clothes, he walked in his park with guests, dispensing with his usual wood-chopping. A court marshal said Wilhelm and his wife Hermine were well and in the best of spirits.

He asked that his birthday be observed quietly in keeping with the spirit of the fatherland. In wartime Germany festivities are few and simple. The banquet customarily given on Wilhelm's birthday was cancelled.

The presence of a dozen German troops in Doorn is the only reminder of the European war.

Wilhelm is said to have his pace, his eyes alight with the old military spirit, each time he passes and salutes the German sentry presenting arms.

STENOGRAPHICAL COURSES PLANNED

Review and improvement classes in stenographical work and bookkeeping may be added to the Klamath program of the NYA defense training system, it was announced Wednesday by Principal Lloyd B. Emery of Klamath Union high school.

Upon confirmation of a requisition sent to the state department of vocational education, announcement of registration will be made. The classes would be from 3 to 5 p. m. daily, five days a week in the commercial department of the high school under an instructor yet to be selected.

The classes will be for those between the ages of 16 and 24 inclusive who have had some training and preferably some experience in stenographical work, rather than for beginners, Emery stated.

Other technical and shop courses are also under consideration, according to an announcement from Earl I. Rice, NYA area director, who will be in Klamath Falls Thursday afternoon, January 30, for interviews. Anyone within the age limit who is out of school and in need of employment, work-experience and training can secure information on the NYA national defense training program by calling at the Oregon State Employment office, 242 Main street.

GIRL STOWAWAY HIDES ON WARSHIP

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 29 (UP)—Pretty Shirley Dale of Flint, Mich., Tuesday night was placed in police custody after she was discovered stowing away aboard a destroyer just two hours before the warship sailed for Hawaii.

The dark haired, 23-year-old girl was discovered hiding behind the huge diesels in the engine room of the U. S. S. Long and after questioning her, navy intelligence officers turned Miss Dale over to police.

Although the navy men were willing to dismiss her attempt to stow away as a prank, what worried them was that she was able to get aboard the destroyer at a time when the navy is under virtually wartime restrictions, without showing a "liberty card."

"It was easy," the girl said. "I just took a shoreboat with a bunch of sailors, ambled up the companionway past the guards and slipped into the engine room."

OREGON RECEIVES FOREST PAYMENT

PORTLAND, Jan. 29 — Oregon's forest service receipts for the fiscal year ending last June 30 came to about \$660,000, Lyle F. Watts, regional forester here, said today.

The state treasurer shortly will receive \$165,165.48 which represents the 25 per cent distributed to the county road and school funds in lieu of taxes. An additional 10 per cent is allotted for road and trail construction and maintenance in national forests of the state.

Oregon's national forest income is second only to that of Washington's, Watts said. Washington's 25 per cent amounts to \$208,142.

The forest service spent \$5,935,873.57 in Oregon during the year, Watt continued.

CHRISTIAN UNITY PROGRESS LAUDED

PORTLAND, Jan. 29 (P)—Christian unity has progressed more in the last 30 years than in the preceding 400, Dr. Graham Frank of Dallas, Texas, told a statewide brotherhood convocation of Christian churches yesterday.

The "day of non-cooperative, competitive, narrow-minded sectarianism is past," the secretary

of the international convention of Disciples of Christ asserted. "Such disunity is totally inadequate to meet or master the forces of evil now abroad in our world."

WILKIE VIEWED AS SUCCESSOR TO N. Y. CONGRESSMAN

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (P)—The name of Wendell L. Wilkie has been added to those mentioned for the late Kenneth F. Simpson's congressional seat as representative from Manhattan's 17th district.

Harvey J. Schwamm, new republican leader of New York's seventh assembly district, expressed an opinion yesterday that Wilkie would be the "ideal" republican candidate. He said he would ask Governor Herbert H. Lehman to delay a special election for the post until the 1940 presidential candidate, now in England, could be consulted.

State Senator Frederick R. Couderc Jr., and former Rep. Bruce Barton also have been mentioned. Barton said he would decline the nomination, if offered it.

HIT AND RUN

TOLEDO, Jan. 29 (P)—An unidentified man was seriously injured last night, apparently by a hit-run automobile, Wayne Franklin, Toledo farmer, discovered the unconscious form on the Corvallis-Newport highway and summoned aid.

MEASURE TO CURB STRIKES OFFERED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (P)—Legislation to set up machinery, patterned on the national mediation act, to curb strikes on naval projects of all kinds was introduced today in the house.

The measure would create a naval defense labor board and outlaw strikes on naval projects until 30 days after the board had filed a report as to the merits of the disputes involved, together with recommendations for their solution.

The bill, offered by Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the naval committee, was referred to his committee for consideration. It also would prohibit naval defense contractors from making any change in the rates of pay or working conditions of their employees until 30 days after the board's report was filed.

EX-CHAMPION DIES

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (P)—Police Inspector Matthew J. McGrath, 64, former Olympic hammer-throwing champion, died early today of pneumonia. He won his Olympic title at the 1912 games, when he set a record which stood 24 years. McGrath was a veteran of 39 years on the police force and held two heroism citations.

JOSEPH PATRICK, HOCKEY PIONEER, DIES TUESDAY

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 29 (UP)—Joseph Patrick, Canadian lumberman and father of three prominent hockey executives, died Tuesday. He was 83.

His own interest in the ice sport led him to invest large sums in building rinks in British Columbia. The Patrick hockey legend branched out with Lester now vice president of Madison Square Garden, which controls the New York Rangers; Frank, business manager of the Montreal Canadiens, and Guy, manager of the Vancouver Lions.

Two grandsons, Lunn and Murray Patrick, are members of the Ranger squad. Another son, Stanley, and three daughters also survive.

BULL GOES AGED MAN TO DEATH

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Jan. 29 (P)—A bull gored David G. Lilly, 70, prominent Washington county dairyman, to death on his farm here yesterday. The body was discovered by a hired man.

Lilly's dairy interests were extensive. He was president of the independent milk producers and past president of the Washington county Jersey Cattle club.
