

LIQUOR CLUB COUNTS RULED OUT BY COURT

Circuit Court Judge David H. Vandenberg Wednesday overruled three motions to quash grand jury indictments but at the same time sustained four others.

All seven motions were based on technicalities involved in drawing up the bills. Whether the four quashed indictments would be resubmitted to the grand jury was not revealed.

Each of the four sustained motions were filed by E. E. Driscoll and U. S. Valentine, attorneys for several night club operators and employees charged with maintaining a nuisance and illegal sale of liquor, on the cases of the State of Oregon versus Carlton Wheeler Haynes, Mazie Walters, Carol Martin, and Marshall Claude Spivey.

Haynes was indicted for illegally selling liquor and the other three on nuisance charges.

A second indictment against Haynes on a nuisance charge was allowed to stand. J. C. O'Neill's motion to quash a murder charge against Luther Joe Kirk, young Klamath Indian, was overruled as was H. C. Merryman's motion in the case of Clino Roper, accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

RULING ON NURSES ISSUED BY BOARD

Services of a health nurse will continue in 4-H club camps and homemakers camps, but organizations maintained by contributions such as Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Camp Fire girls, must provide their own nurses. This was the decision announced by the Klamath county board of health in session Tuesday night at the health unit.

The 4-H and homemakers' camps are maintained partly by taxation and can be included in the health program of the unit, it was announced.

All members of the board were present for the first meeting in 1941 including the two new members, Vance Vaupel, and William Ganong, and Chairman U. E. Reeder, Fred Peterson, Dr. L. L. Truax, Dr. A. O. Roenicke, Henry Rodisch, mayor of Chiloquin, and Dr. Peter H. Rozendal. Klamath county health officer. Also present were William Bruce Davis, county sanitarian, and Mrs. Blanche O'Malley, office secretary.

Office procedure and records were discussed by Dr. Rozendal for the benefit of the board. The 1941 policies were outlined and accepted.

SPEED URGED IN BUILDING OREGON ROADS FOR ARMY

PORTLAND, Jan. 30 (AP)—Oregon highways must be rushed to a military standard, Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the state motor association, said Wednesday.

"Modern armies must be highly mobile and hard hitting," he said. "The highway bottlenecks of mountain curves, narrow pavement and shaky bridges must go."

He added that the association was studying the entire Oregon highway system to determine what work had to be done and its cost.

"One of the biggest needs right now is for access roads to new military camps, to new defense area plants and for maneuvering troops over routes they would traverse at top speed in the event of hostilities," he continued. "Through our study we want to locate these vital spots in Oregon and the road handicaps that affect them."
