Judging from the way Joe Louis is pointing for retribution after his sad performance against Al McCoy, they'll probably pack Clarence Burman out of the Madison Square ring Friday night after a few furious rounds, but at the same time there's something to be said on behalf of the challenger.

What with 10 to 1 odds quoted against him, Red isn't given much of a chance in most pregame yarns originating in New York. Yet there are a few things to be said.

Burman isn't the weakest of the many so-called contenders who have stepped into the ring against the world champ. His last knockout was hung up by John Henry Lewis, in 1936, when Burman was a light-heavy. He's a veteran in experience and is young enough to take punishment.

Gayle Talbot ranks him as a more deserving contender than were Jack Roper, Harry Thomas, Johnny Paycheck, Al McCoy, John Henry Lewis, Nathan Mann, Arturo Godoy and even Tommy Farr. Lewis was washed up when he met the bomber, and Burman decided Farr after the latter's famed with the champion.

Since he started meeting heavyweights, Burman has won far more fights than he has lost.

HE DROPS 'EM IN

Walter "Boots" Dropp, capitalizing on his name, snapped his own state basketball scoring record when he tallied 53 points in a recent high school game at Plainfield, Conn. His former record, termed "modern" because of recent rule changes, was 41. Prior to that someone hung up a single game total of 72.

The national open golf scoring mark is pretty apt to be broken next June at the Colonial club in Fort Worth, Texas. The boys in charge have decided against toughening up the course for the championship.

The record—281 for 72 holes—was registered by Ralph Guldahl in the 1937 open at Birmingham, Mich. Golf experts believe any score higher than 280 will be completely out of the running.

Harlemites Toy With Hapless David Quintet In Impressive Victory

Those amazing Globetrotters from New York City thrilled a capacity audience last night at the Klamath armory with a sparkling exhibition of basketball that seldom, if ever, has been equalled by traveling casaba contingents that have entertained at the local arena.

The score was 50-23 for the Harlemites, world's professional hoop champions, over a badly-outclassed House of David five, but the tally of the fracas was of little significance. As a matter of fact few fans cared what the count was.

In the initial period "Rosy" Hudson, set-shot artist for the colored boys, settled down to the apparently serious business of running up the score on the seemingly helpless Davidites who stayed in a close-knit zone defense. And the dusky little cager did it practically alone. Of the 20 shots he tried in the opening half 12 swished through the iron ring with almost monotonous regularity.

At the intermission the Globetrotter quintet was ahead, 38-9, and from then on the leaders toyed and clownned their way to ultimate victory. Second half totals actually favored the young Davids, 16-12, but several of their points were virtual gifts by the Harlem crew.

Once after Wayne Payton, blond pivot man for the bearded clan, had vainly tried to tip in a basket three Trotters picked up the unlucky lad and he dropped the ball through the net with an embarrassed look on his face. In another instance the classy colored cassabats stood stock-still while an opponent dribbled in for a basket unmolested.

Hudson and Duke Cumberland, the other Harlem forward, put on a two-man show in the third quarter while the other eight contestants stood around watching the crazy proceedings. Each tried to outdo the other in a private little game that had the spectators in an uproar.

They played football and baseball besides pulling the old "hidden ball" trick or rather attempting it to their opponents' chagrin and the spectators' delight. Then the New York club topped it all off with an exhibition of a player pileup in slow motion that was a treat to watch.

Hudson with 32 points was high man for the contest. In all he attempted 25 shots and 16 of those were good to account for his aggregate. Center Charley Young was next in line with 12 counters. Payton of the House of David was best scorer for his team with eight tallies.

In two Commercial league preliminaries that preceded the main attraction the Knights of Columbus five ran roughshod over Tik Tok, 48-15, in the seven o'clock affair and Rickys Jewelry beat out Gieners Grocery of Chiloquin, 29-16, in the eight o'clock tussle.

Captain Earl Brooks paced the Knights to their tenth win in 11 games with 12 points while Lou Aiello was the spark of the Ricky attack with the same number of markers.

The full squad of 11 Klamath players will leave at noon Friday for two engagements with the Bend team, Friday and Saturday nights. The games will not count in district standings.

By virtue of their good performance against the Oregon Frosh here last weekend and comparative scores, the Pelicans will engage the Bears as strong favorites.

Oregon's booming freshmen handed the Lava Bears a decisive thumping, while on the following night the Pelicans held John Warren's crew to a narrow 42-36 decision.

Bend split both their two-game series with Lakeview and also divided a couple of contests with The Dalles. They have been defeated by Ashland. On the other side of the ledger the Lava Bears defeated Prineville and Redmond.

Klamath's Pelicans will use a fast break, having found that type of offense most effective against the Oregon Frosh, but Coach French's boys will be hampered by lack of room on the small Bend floor.
