VAN VACTOR TO HELP STATE IN SLAYING CASES

Dayton E. Van Vactor, Klamath Falls city attorney, Thursday was appointed deputy district attorney and special prosecutor by District Attorney Orth Sismore to aid in the state's prosecution of James Q. Anderson and Luther Joe Kirk, both of whom are held on murder indictments.

Van Vactor has long been a successful trial lawyer in Klamath courts. Anderson, 17-year-old son of O. T. "Buck" Anderson, prominent Beatty cattleman, was indicted Thursday by the grand jury on a charge of second degree murder growing out of the gun death of Jerry Zukoski, 31, a cow hand on the elder Anderson's ranch.

Kirk, young Klamath Indian, is charged with the murder of Leonard Johns, also an Indian, in Bonanza last fall.

County Clerk Mae K. Short said that Van Vactor will be paid \$300 per case by the county.

BIG WRECKER PUT IN SERVICE HERE

Literally "flow" back to Klamath Falls to be put into 24-hour service here, a giant Holmes heavy duty wrecker has been secured by the Balsiger Motor company.

The big machine is capable of handling anything that travels the highways, according to Balsiger officials, and has a load capacity of about 15 tons. It is the only machine of its kind on the coast between Sacramento and Portland.

The wrecker was driven back to Klamath Falls from Chattanooga, Tenn., by C. L. Snodgrass, Balsiger's maintenance foreman, after he had flown there to pick it up.

Leaving Medford by United Airlines January 12 and transferring to American Airlines at Los Angeles, Snodgrass arrived at Chattanooga at midnight, January 13, and started west with the big wrecker the next day. He returned via the southern route.

The wrecker is equipped with two booms, powered from the truck's motor.

Its driver will be Joe Hardie.

SALEM, Jan. 31 (AP)—Oregon prepared for a 1943 celebration with incorporation yesterday of the Oregon Trail Centennial association.

Cities along the original Old Oregon Trail would stage celebrations in observance of first use of the route 100 years ago.

Members of the association met with Governor Sprague and outlined plans for coordinating the celebrations. They told him Baker has already laid plans for a July, 1943, celebration. The Dalles is considering one, and the Pendleton Round-up will tie in.

Willamette valley residents could join with a celebration at Champoug, site of the first provisional government in the Oregon territory, they said.
