NEWSREEL PHOTO EXPERT AT LAKE

CRATER LAKE—Parris Emery, Universal newsreel photographer, and R. A. Work, associate irrigation engineer of the Soil Conservation service spent the past week in Crater Lake park photographing snow survey activities.

Emery has been taking pictures of actual snow surveying which will go into a reel called "Stranger Than Fiction" or a travellog called "Going Places."

He was pleased to find excellent weather for photography.

The actual snow surveying was done by R. A. Work and his assistant, Bill Childreth. The surveys are used as a basis for forecasting irrigation supply and stream flow. Essentially snow surveys determine the amount of water stored as snow on timbered watersheds.

From here Emery and Work plan to go to Seven Lakes snow course, 16 miles southwest of Fort Klamath, where they will continue their work.
